After which His Majefly was pleafed to make the following most gracious Speech. My Lords and Gentlemen,

I Are new cometo put an End to this Selfion, which though it hath advanced fo far into the Summer, cannot be thought a tedious one, when we confider how much Business hath been done, and the great Advantages that may be expected from it.

Tour scaffnable Vigour and Perseverance to support me in the M. asures I have taken with my Allies, for refloring the Tranquility of Europe, have produced 180/t if the Fifests I could desire. Much the greatest Part of Cheistundem is already freed from the Calamitics of War, and by what bath happened both abroad and a home, my People must be convinced, that their Welfsre is insuper the Strength and Security of my Government.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I return you my Thanks for the Supplies you have raifed for the Service of the current Year, and it is a particular Satisfastion to me, that a Method has been found out for making good the Deficiencies of my Civil Lift, without laying any new Burthen upon my Subjects. The good Foundation you have prepared this Seffin for the Payment of the National Debts, and the Difcharge of a great Part of them, without the leaft Violation of the publick Faith, will, I hope, frengthen more and more the Union I defire to fee amongft all my Subjects, and make our Friendjhip yet more valuable to all Foreign Powers.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

Tou all fee the good Effetts which our Steadiness hath produced; there remains but listle on our Part to fatusfy the World, that more Credit, Security and Greatnuss, is to be acquired by following the Views of Peace, and adhering strictly to just Engagements, than by depending on the Advantages of War, or by pursuing the Massfures of Ambition. To complete what remains unfinished, I propose very speedily to vifit my Dominions in Germany, boping to put an End to those Troubles in the North, which are now reduced to a very marrow Compast. I flatter myself, that my PreJeace this Summer in these Parts will prove useful to our poor Protestant Brethren, for whom you have expressed fuch feosonable and charitable Sentiments.

I could wish, that all my Subjects, convinced by Time and Experience, would lay aside those Partialisies and Animolities which prevent them from living quietly, and enjoying the Happinels of a mild legal Government; it is what I chuse to recommend at this time, when I am fensible that all Opposition to it is become wain and useless, and can only end unfortunately for those who shall still persist in struggling against it. 1 am perswaded, that, during my Ausence, every one of you will take particular.
