Rome, June 13.

THe Pope to shew his resentment of the injury done the Cardinal *Anthony*, by the Commissioner of the Chamber of Accounts here, who it seems had seized and taken possession of the Marquisate of *Nemi*, part of the Estate of the late Count *Franchipani*, without so much as acquainting his Eminence therewith, who by vertue of a settlement, claimed the same, hath caused the said Commissioner to be immediately put out of his employment, and the said Marquisate to be restored to the Cardinal, who now quietly enjoys the same.

Signior *Magalotti* had some days since Audience of his Holiness, and afterwards of the Cardinal *Altieri*, but we hear not of anything he hath effected touching the Levies he desired to make in the Ecclesiastical Dominions, for the service of his most Christian Majesty; it is said, he is preparing for his departure again, intending for *Genoua*, *Lucca*, and other parts in *Italy*.

On Tuesday last *Donna Laura* the Popes Niece, was happily delivered of a Son, to the great joy of the Family of the *Altieri*. The Spanish Ambassador having excused his past deportment to the Cardinal *Altieri*, in the reception of the Duke de *Gravina*, hath since at a visit he made him, received and treated that Duke, with all the respect due to the quality of the Popes Nephew, having given him the hand in his own house, and in all other things carried himself towards him, as Ambassadors from Crowned Heads, have always practised to the Nephews of the Pope Regna it.

Some difference having lately happened here between the Prince de *Sulmona-Borghese*, Son to the Princess *Rossino-Aldobrandina*, and the Prince de *Venafro*, the former sent a challenge to meet the other with Seconds, but the Cardinal *Patron* having had notice thereof, timely prevented them from an action, which besides the hazard of their own lives, would certainly have proved of farther consequence, considering the greatness of their Relations and Dependents.

Signior *Burgellini* the Popes Nuncio in the Court of *France*, is certainly recalled home, and we are told, that Signior *Nerli* late Nuncio in *Poland* and *Germany*, is designed to succeed him in that employment.

We have advice, that the Captain *Bassa* is at present with a Fleet of 70 Gallies at *Valona*, causing great fears and apprehensions to the Neighbouring Countries; nor are we unconcerned at the frequent alarms we receive of the Turks design upon *Poland* and the *Ukrain* this Summer; the Grand Signior being, as is said, marched in person with a very powerful Army towards those parts; it is here thought, that in case that Kingdom be attacked; his Holiness will not be wanting to send them all the succor he may; but we hope things will not come so far.

It is in all Mens mouths about Town, that the Marquis d' *Astorgas*, Ambassador here from *Spain*, is designed for the Government of *Naples*, upon

the removal of Don *Pedro d' Arragon* the present Vice-Roy, but of this yet no certainty.

Leghorn, June 25. Sir *William Fennings* may be ready in Six or Eight days to return to *Zant*, to Convoy the *Turky* ships for *England*: The Galley built at *Pisa*, upon the account of the King of *England*, is on its way down the River hither, and is expected with the first fair weather in this Port.

Hambrough, June 26. The surrender of *Brunswick* affords much matter of discourse here, as yet we hear not what the Terms of that Treaty are; this day according to our last advice, that Town is to do homage to the Dukes, who have already given orders for the marching of their Forces towards these parts; hereupon our Magistrates begin to bestir themselves as if they apprehended some danger.

From *Copenhagen* they write, of their Majesties having been Crowned at *Fredericksburgh*, with all imaginable Solemnity and Magnificence; and that they were since returned thither again, attended by most of the Nobility of that Kingdom. From *Warsaw* they tell us, that the Grand Visier hath written to the under Chancellor of *Poland*, assuring him that the Grand Signior hath not the least thoughts tending to the prejudice of that Kingdom, but that on all occasions he will manifest his sincere intentions of maintaining inviolable the present peace and good correspondence with that Crown; with all desiring, that the *Sieur Wylocki*, who at present resides at the Port may be recalled home, as being a person not very agreeable to those Ministers, and some other Person appointed to succeed him: They further write, that it was thought the *Starosta* of *Radomski* might be made choice of for that Employment; and that the *Weywode* of *Culme* is gone to *Moskow* in quality of Ambassador, to endeavor the settling a more firm Peace with those People. All our Letters from thence tell us, that *Stephan Radzi*n is taken Prisoner, yet with so much uncertainty, as to particulars, that they leave some room still to doubt the truth thereof.

Wolfenbuttel, June 28. Yesterday the *Velt Marshal* the *Comte de Waldeck*, together with the General *Wachmeester Chauwert*, and other Principal Officers of the Army, went into the Town of *Brunswick*, to dispose things there in a fit manner for the Reception of the Dukes, who this day are to make their solemn entry into the place, to receive the Homage from the hands of the Magistrates. The Dukes have put into the Town two Regiments to lie in Garrison there, for some time at least. His Highness the Prince of *Orange*, having been present at a General Rendezvous, the Dukes had ordered to be made of all their Forces, for the entertainment of his Highness, is gone to visit the Elector of *Brandenburgh* at *Berlin*.

Antwerp, June 26. Most of the French Nobility that came to see these places, are now returned. The Chancellor of *Liege* is on his way for *Charleroy*, to Compliment his most Christian Majesty at his arrival there, on the part of the Elector of *Cologne* his Master.

We are told that the Duke d' *Aerschat* Governor of *Mons*, upon some Alarme they had there, wrote to his Excellency the Count de *Monterey* for more
