THE General Diet of the Helvetick Body, which meets regularly once a Year soon after Midsummer, is now going to assemble at Frawenfelt, and the Deputies from all the Cantons will repair thither in very few Days. We have no News as yet of the Return of the French Ambassadour from his Court, so that in Case his Absence continues, the usual Compliments to the said Diet will be made by M. de la Martiniere, Secretary of the French Embassy, on the Part of his Excellency; which Secretary will attend the Diet in Person to that End. The Persons deputed by this Canton to go and enquire into the Damage sustained by the Inhabitants of Thun, a little Town about four Leagues from hence, occasioned by a sudden Inundation of the Lake of that Name, being returned hither, have made their Report to the Sovereign Council, and it is now under Deliberation how to indemnify the poor Sufferers, many of whom are reduced to the utmost Distress. On Sunday last a general Collection was made throughout this City and Part of the Canton, for repairing the great Loss sustained at Lausanne, and in that Neighbourhood, by the Tempest of Hail and Wind that happened there the 7th past, in which above 200 Acres of Vineyards, 1000 Fruit Trees, and 2000 other Trees were destroyed, besides other considerable Damage done to the City of Lausanne, and the adjacent Villages. The solemn Deputation that went three Weeks ago on the Part of this Canton to the Bishop of Porentru, to mediate a Peace between that Prelate and his Subjects of Bienne, are still there, and it is not yet known when those Deputies will have finished their Commission, by reason of the Difficulties they meet with on that Subject.

Stockholm, June 18, O. S. The Muscovite Gallies which made lately the Ravages in the Bothnick Gulf about Uma, passed the last Week between the Islands on the Finnish Coast and the Continent, and retired towards Wyburg and Petersburg. On the 15th Instant the Archbishop of Upsal, and a Committee of Ten of the Clergy, waited on the King to represent the Inconveniences their whole Order suffers by the long Continuance of the present Assembly of the States, and to pray that they may be dismissed as soon as possible; and the Peasants having made like Complaint, it is probable an End will be put to this Session next Week, though as yet no Answer has been given to the King's last Letter.

Copenhagen, July 6, N. S. On the 29th past the Lord Carteret, his Britannick Majesty's Ambassadour, arrived at Fredericksbourg. His Excellency having brought with him the Treaty of Peace between Denmark and Sweden, agreed to and signed on the part of Sweden, that Treaty was, after a Conference on the 1st and another on the 2d Instant with the Danish Ministers, agreed to likewise by the King of Denmark, and signed by his Minister Plenipotentiary on the 3d.

Paris, July 13. The Congress for the Peace with Spain is appointed to be held at Cambray, and an Act is to be signed here by the Ministers of the Powers engaged in the War, for the fixing the Time when the Plenipotentiaries are to meet there. It is advised from Sicily, that the first Imbarcation of the Spanish Troops, to the Number of 12000 Men, sailed on the 17th past for Spain. The Marshal de Villars is by Order retired from Court to his Country Seat at Villars.

Whitehall, July 8. His Majesty has been pleased to grant the Dignity of a Baronet of the Kingdom of Great-Britain to Sir William Sanderson, K^t.
