Plymouth, June 27.

Yesterday arrived here from the *Downes* the *Crown* and *Tyger* Frigats, with about Twenty sayl of Marchant men under their Convoy, bound for the *Streights*. *Vienna, June 14.* Tuesday last being the Emperors Birth day, was celebrated here with Feasting, Dancing, and other publick rejoycings, which yet seems was somewhat interrupted by a Dispute that happened between the Prince *Lobkowitz*, and the *Sieur de Gremonville* the French Resident here, about precedency, as is laid.

We hear that the Count *de Botzkay*, a person highly concerned in the late Rebellion, is secured in *Hungary* and bringing Prisoner hither. The Widow of the late *Palatine of Hungary* is likewise under restraint, in order to her examination in these matters.

From the Frontiers they tell us, that we have nothing to apprehend from the *Turks* this Summer; that the *Turkish* Ministers are at present wholly against any War, and omit not to perswade the Grand Signior from any such thoughts, which though it may be probable enough, yet this Court is resolved, not to trust to that, and therefore talk of raising 6000 men in the Empire, and the like number in the Hereditary Countries.

From *Presburgh* they write, that all things are very quiet and peaceable, and that the Bishop of *Graz* hath lately published in his Imperial Majesties name a general Pardon to all those Inhabitants, for any forfeitures or other punishment they or their Estates may be liable to, by reason of any thing by them transacted, during the late troubles, to the infinite satisfaction of those poor people.

Naples, June 9. Here hath lately appeared upon our Coast several *Turkish* Brigantines, which hath made us stand continually upon our Guard, for the preventing whatever design they may have in hand; The 7th instant, two of them coming pretty near our shoar, the Governor sent out two Gallies against them, who took one of the said Brigantines, and chased the other off to Sea, though not with the same success. On Friday last was brought hither the Heads of two famous *Banditti*, to be presented to our Governor. His Excellency hath ordered some Companies of Spanish foot, to march towards *Capo d' Otranto* for the security of those parts.

Palermo, June 25. Some days since our Vice-Roy the Prince *de Ligne* returned hither, together with his Lady from *Bragaria*, where they have been some time for the confirmation of their healths. The 27th instant arrived a Vessel in Five days from *Zant*, with Letters from that Governor to his Excellency, advising him of the great preparations of the *Turks*; that the Captain *Bassa* was at present at Sea, with 300 sayl of all sorts, of which, 80 were Gallies, 40 men of War, and the rest Gallies and other small Boats; and that the general report

was, that their designe might be against *Naples* or this Kingdom; which news hath a little alarmed us here, though after all, we hope those fears are without any great reason.

Dantzick, June 26. Our advices of the *Turks* design upon *Poland* this Summer are so full of uncertainty, that we know not how far we may credit them: From *Warsaw* they tell us, that the Grand Visier, had by his letters satisfied them that they were but groundless and perhaps malicious reports, that have so frequently of late allarmed them with the news of the approach of the Grand Signiors Forces, to joyn with the Rebel *Cossacks* in the *Ukrain*, for the subduing that Country; that his Masters intentions were, to observe inviolably the present Peace, and that all his actions should correspond thereunto.

In the meantime we hear, that the King had sent a person of principal quality amongst the *Cossacks*, with a considerable sum of Money into the *Ukrain*, to endeavor by all means possible, to perswade those people to return to the obedience they owe that Crown; but that at his arrival there, he had met with quite other usage then he expected; the *Cossacks* instead of hearkening to his Proposals, making bold to ease him of his Money, and withall forcing him to confels several secrets of much importance, to the affairs of that Kingdom; however *Hanenko* the other General of the *Cossacks*, continues constant to the interest of the *Poles*, and is at present encamped with 10000 men on this side the *Nieper*.

We are told of an other incursion lately made into some of the remote parts of *Poland* by the *Tartars*, that they have done great mischief, and carried several hundreds of the miserable inhabitants away with them.

Brunswick, June 28. Here are at present in the Town 4. Regiments of Foot, which take the sole charge of the Walls; General Major *Stauf* Commander in chief; with his Regiment on the part of the Duke of *Wolfembuttell*; Collonel *Rassfeld* with his Regiment, on the part of the Duke of *Zell*; Colonel *Michael*'s Regiment for the Duke of *Hannover*; and Colonel *Degenfeld*'s Regiment, for the Bishop of *Osnabrugh*; the rest of the Dukes Forces are on their march home again: The 23. instant the said Dukes made their Entry into this place, and received the homage of the Magistracy, and the same day returned again: It is laid the Duke of *Wolfembuttell*, intends to make his constant residence here, having to that end given directions for the providing a Palace fit to receive him.

Wee are told that in the Siege they lost but thirty men, and that none of them were persons of any quality.

Ostend, June 28. Here is lately arrived from *St. Sebastian*, Four Companies of Spanish Foot consisting in all of 230 men; upon their arrival they were all new clothed, and received Nine Guilders apiece, one of these Companies is to remain in Garrison here, the other are to march towards *Newport* and *Aelft*.

Wee dayly expect 4000 Spaniards more, who according to our last advice were ready to embarke for these Countries. The Dutch Fleet under the command of the

the Lieutenant Admiral *de Ruyter*; is at present within sight of this place, in number about 45 Sail of all sorts.

Cologne, June 30. Yesterday was another meeting of the Deputies of the respective Princes, at present Mediators in the difference depending with our Elector; what advance they have made in that affair we yet know not; in the mean time the said Elector continues so positive in his demands, that altogether, we very much fear things may come to a rupture; and therefore our Magistrate have resolved to raise immuredly 2000 man more, for the defence and security of the place.

Bremen, July 1. The principal Articles concluded upon the surrender of *Brunswick*, are it seems very hard for the Town, being said to be these,

1. That the Inhabitants shall do homage to the Duke of *Wolfenbuttel*, and take the oath of Allegiance as the rest of his Subjects do.

2. That they deliver up their Arms, Gunns, Ammunition &c. into the hands of the Duke.

3. That they disband their Soldiers, and receive a Garrison from the Duke.

4. That the Town with its Territory, shall be obliged to pay the third part of all Taxes that shall for the future be laid upon the whole Country.

5. That they presently pay 300 thousand *Rixdollars* for their disobedience: And lastly, That there shall be kept 5000 men at their charge, till such time as the Duke shall have built a Cittadel in the Town, which he intends it seems to do forthwith.

On *Friday* last was performed the Ceremony of homage by the Town to the Duke.

Hague, July 2. This afternoon the Princess Dowager of *Orange* was carried to her house in the *Bosch*, having been of late very much indisposed, and advised to this removal by her Physicians, for the change of Air. This day the Heer *van Odyck* parted hence for *Zealand*, where the States of that Province are to assemble the 6th instant; and on Thursday next the States of *Holland* are likewise to meet for the first time. Our Fleet according to our Letters of the 30th past, was then in the *Wielingen*, in a very good condition.

Brussels, July 3. The 27th instant Monsieur de *Louigny* returned hither from the *Hague*, where he had been to confer with those States, concerning some matters of importance. The 28 was performed with great Solemnity in the Chappel of the Archbishop of *Malines*, the Consecration of *Francois de Bullincourt* Bishop of *Bruges*.

The Magistrates of this place having had a general assembly concerning what his Excellency had proposed to them relating to Fortifications, have finally agreed to the raising of 200 000 *Gilders* more, to be employed on that work. The French Court is still at *Aeth*, and as is said, will not part from thence for *St. Germain* till about the latter end of the next week.

Paris, July 3. From the Court at *Aeth*, of the 28 instant they write, that the King hath granted Commissions to most of the Reformed Officers that are there, for the forming of as many Companies, to consist of 50 Men apiece; and to that end, hath ordered 30 men to be taken out of each Company now on foot, which with the Leavies they are to make, will compleat their several Companies. They farther speak, of more Forces the King is about raising, as well at home, as in *Switzerland*, *Germany*, and other parts; That at *Aeth* the Army hath been ever since the 16 at work, about plaining the Hill that lies on one side of that Town, and that the King hath caused two Sluces to be made there, for the greater security of the place.

That one of the Kings Musketeers; having by order of the Duke *de Duras*, Commander in chief of the Kings Forces in *Flanders*, received correction for some misdemeanor by him committed, which it seems he could not well brooke, had sent a Challenge to the said Duke, to meet him some where, in his Catholick Majesties Dominions, in order to the giving him satisfaction for the injury he supposed done him; of which the King having been informed, had caused the said Musketeer to be immediately secured, being much offended at this insolence, and that it was thought, it might go near to cost him his life.

That the Duke of *Lorraine* had lately sent thither two Gentlemen, the Sieur *Serinchamp*, and the Sieur *de Geroncourt*, to negotiate his affairs in that Court. Some days since the Archbishop of *Thou-louze* passed this place incognito, on his return from his Embassy in *Spain*, on his way towards the Court, which by this time we suppose may be removing towards this place.

At length the Abbé *le Camus*, Bishop of *Grenoble*, hath after a long expectation, received his Confirmatory Bulls from *Rome*, together with an excuse from the Cardinal *Altieri*, for the delay they have met with.

The young Duke of *Anjou* continues very much indisposed, and not without some fear of danger. From *Cologne* our last Letters tell us, that the Mediators were very sudainly to meet for the final concluding of those matters; That the Duke of *Lorraine* was very ill, and kept his bed, and that the Garrison which that Duke has in *Homburgh*, had lately taken the oath of Fidelity to the Emperor, and put themselves under his protection.

From *Ratisbonne* they write, of the little progress they make at that Dyet, in any of the publick concerns of the Empire, through the great disunion amongst the Deputies in the matter before them, and now especially, in the absence of the Bishop of *Aichstad*, whose great Prudence and Authority, gave life to those affairs. Monsieur *Colbert*, and Monsieur *le Tellier* are dayly expected here from *Flanders*, for the preparing several matters against the Kings arrival.

Whitehall, July 2. This day was solemnly Consecrated in the Chappel at *Lambeth*, the Right Reverend Fathers in God, Doctor *Nathaniel Crew* Bishop of *Oxon*, and Doctor *Thomas Wood* Bishop of *Litchfield* and *Covenry*; the Ceremony being performed, with the usual Solemnity, by his Grace the L. Archbishop of *Canterbury*, assisted by the Bishops of *London*, *Ely*, *Lincoln*, *Worcester*, and *Rochester*, in the presence of several of the Nobility and persons of Honor, before whom was preached an excellent and Learned Sermon upon the occasion, by Mr. *Tomkins*, one of his Graces Chaplains.
