THE Dyet of the Eight Old Cantons that continued at Frawentelt after the Separation of the General Dyet, broke up last Week, and the Deputies of the Three Cantons of Zurich, Berne, and Glaris, who are Sovereigns of the County of Baden, are now assembled at the City of that Name, to dispatch such Affairs as regard those Three Cantons in common, after which they will return to their respective Homes. They have resolved in this Session at Baden, that their Bailiff, who resides there, shall for the future assist at the Council of that City on the Election of all Officers depending upon the Magistrates, for the better maintaining the Peace, which is often violated upon such Occasions. However it appears that this Resolution is not at all pleasing to the Magistracy of that Place, and is looked upon as a Novelty, and a kind of Infracton of their Privileges. The Deputies of this Canton are still in Conference at Morat with those of Fribourg, for adjusting the Limits of the Two States, which is a Matter that has been in dispute for near a hundred Years together. It is thought things will be finally determined by the Care and Application of the present Commissioners on both Sides. Letters from Coire of the 27th past, give an Account of a Difference of some Moment that has been on foot above a Year, between the Community of Schoultz in the Lower Engadine, and the Regency of Inspruck. The latter having formed some Pretensions upon a Forrest which the aforesaid Community has possessed for above an Age without Molestation, the Imperial Envoy Baron de Greuth, some Commissioners from Inspruck, and certain Deputies of the Grisons, met last Autumn upon the Confines to examine the Titles of both Parties, and to endeavour to adjust this Difference amicably; but that Conference was ineffectual, and nothing else could be agreed upon but to leave Matters in the Situation they found them without any Alteration, till such Time as the Business should be better examined in another Conference. In the mean Time the Inhabitants of Schoultz disliking these Delays, and being persuaded that the Regency of Inspruck had raised a Pretension that was altogether new and unwarrantable, resolved in a tumultuous manner to make use of their Rights, and went to the Forrest in a Body, where they cut down about 7000 great Trees, engaging mutually to each other by a formal Oath to maintain the Possession of the Forrest, and to defend one another with their Lives and Goods. Hercupon Baron Greuth made great Complaints of this Disorder to the Heads of the Leagues, declaring to them that if they did not put an immediate Stop to these Violences, the Regency of Inspruck would take such Measures as they should judge proper. Orders were sent thereupon by the Chiefs to the People of Schoultz to forbid them to carry off the Wood they had cut, but it is doubted whether they will respect such Orders, because they are enraged to see those Rights disputed which they have possessed Time out of Mind.

Berlin, Aug. 10. The King of Prussia is expected here this Afternoon from Potsdam, and sets out on the 15th Instant for Hanover, where his Majesty proposes to be the following Evening. This Court has received by the last Post from M. Caningieffer the Prussian Minister at Vienna, the Emperour's Resolution concerning the Affairs of Religion in the Empire; but it is not yet made publick. Letters from Petersburg advise, that M. Romanzow an Adjutant-General of the Czar's, had Orders to set out for Stockholm, to compliment the King of Sweden on his Accession to the Throne.

Hague, Aug. 16. The French Ambassadour M. Morville has received Notice from his Court, that he is to assist as third Plenipotentiary of France at the Congress of Cambray, with the Archbishop of Cambray and M. de St. Contest; but an Alteration

is made in the King of Spain's Nomination of his, for the Marquess de Marjorado who was designed to be first Ambassadour and Plenipotentiary having excused himself from this Commission, the Count de St. Eltevan de las Navas is appointed in his Place, with the Marquess Beretti Landi: The Marquess de Monteleone is ordered to reside here during M. Beretti Landi's Absence.

The Commissioners for examining, stating, and determining the Debts due to the Army, &c. give Notice to the Officers of the Regiments under-mentioned, which served abroad during the late War, that they have directed the Colonels of the said Regiments, or their Agents, to state the particular Accounts of the said Officers, and a so of the Troops and Companies of the said Regiments, agreeable to the Regimental State determined by the said Commissioners, and to lay them before the Commissioners with all convenient Speed; and the said Officers are hereby required by themselves, or their lawful Attornies, to adjust and settle their particular Accounts with the said Colonels, or their Agents, on or before the 6th of October next, at which time the Colonels or Agents are required to lay the Accounts so distributed before the Commissioners, in order to their determining and certifying the Debts due to the said Officers: And all Persons that have any Assignments made by the Officers of the said Regiments, upon their Arrears of Pay due in the said Regiments, are required forthwith to enter their Assignments with the Agent of the Regiment to which the Officer under whom they claim did belong, and the Agents are required, upon producing the said Assignments, to make true Entries thereof, expressing the Assignor's Name, Quality, and Troop, or Company in which he served, the Assignee's Name, the Sum assigned, and Date of Assignment, and to lay the same before the Commissioners, together with the Accounts of the said Regiments: And all Persons concerned in the said Assignments may have Access to the Agents to examine the same, and where any Dispute shall arise touching any of the said Accounts or Assignments, the Parties may apply to the Commissioners, and in case no Application be made to the Commissioners within 14 Days time after the said 6th of October, they will proceed to certify on the said Accounts, agreeable to the Distributions then to be delivered in by the respective Colonels or Agents.
