Paris, F 19 9 From the Cou A tl of the 5th instant th'y wri e, that the King intended to depart from thence the 10th, and to be in four days he e, and tot at 1d would odge the first night at Quefnoy, the lecond at St. Qu'ntin, the third at Complegne, and the fourth at St. Germains; it is thought the present weakness of the young Duke d' Anjou, .nay have much contributed to haften the Courts return : That the Musketeer who had ient the Challengeto the Duke dc Duras, had been condemned to dye, but by the interceifion of his Friends, had been only disbanded the Guards, and banished the Kingdom, and the Paper he fent the Challenge in, burut by the hand of the common hangman. Monfieur de Nointell, Ambailador at the Port from this Crown, having by feveral Letters complained to the King of his ill treatment by those Ministers, fince his annual there, and of the great Impositi-ons they have layd on all French Commodities, without having any regard to his frequent instances for the redreffing of those, as well as other grie-vances of the French Merchants there; it is faid, his Majesty has thoughts of recalling his Excellency again, and then to declare his refentment of the littles respect sthey have shown his Ambassador. From Rochell we hear, that the Comte d' Estrees

is put to Sea from thence, with his Squadron for Portugal, whither he carries the Dutchels of Ca-daval, and that after he has difembarked her there, he is, as is faid, to fayl for Guinea. That at Charente lies a great man of War ready to part for the East Indies, upon whom goes as we are told, the Steur Gueton, in quality of Director General, for the French East India Company in those parts. Our East India Company have lately received

Letters dated in December last, from their Director at Surat, telling them, of their having been forced, together wich those of other Nations residing there, to leave the place, and retire some Leagues off, upon the approach of a great Body of Indians, in Re-bellion against the Great Mogol, who plundered the place, and fo returned again; that there was in that Bay lading, two French Ships, which might

be ready to fayl'in fanuary or February following. From the Fieuch Court we just now receive advice, that the King left Aeth on Tuesday last, and will be at St, Germains on Saturday nexts they farther toll us, that Madamo Telle d' Orleans having been lately at Mons, out of curiolity to see the place, as the passed into the Town, the common people feeing the Flowers de Luce in her Arms behind her Coach, began to be a little rude to fome of her attendants; but that the Duke d' Aerschot, having had notice of her arrival, came prefently out to meet her, feverely checking the infolence of those people, welcoming her with the Fiting of the great Guns, and offering her all other the Civilities of the place.

Bruffels, Zuly 10. On Thursday last his Excellency the Count de Monterey was at Halle, where he had a conference for several hours with the Duke d'Aerschot, who met his Excellency there from Mons, concerning, as is thought, the prefent condition of that place; we are farther told, that the Duke d' Aerfibot has orders to put the Countrey thereabouts under water, to hinder the approach of any other Forces; and that the Country people are forthwith to bring all their Grain and Forage thither, to Cambray, or to Valenciennes. The Mareshal de Crequi, according to our last advice, is Gill on the Frontiers of Lorrain, with the Troops under his command, ready for a farther march. This day his Excellency accompanied with feveral perfons of quality, is gone for Ghent to fettle some fairs there.

Monsieur de Louvigny is parted for Luxemburgh, where by his Excellencies order he is to command in chief the Cavalry. All the houses have been lately visited in this Town, and a List taken of what men Servants there are, to the end, they may be upon any extraordinary occasion, called into the Kings Service.

There are at present Prisoners in the Castle here, by his Excellencies order, Three Principal Officers, though upon what fcore, we yet certainly know not. This Town hath confented to the raifing the 200000 Florins, demanded by the Governor, to be employed in the work of the Fortifications of this place.

The Princels d'Isenguien, having by an Exprés on Saturday last, received an invitation from her most Christian Majesty, to come and visit her at Grislenguien, within a League of Aeth, on Monday she accordingly met her Majesty there, but was hindred from having any long Conversation with her Majesty, by reason of the news, of the weak condition of the Dake d'Anjou; whereupon her Majefty immediately returned to Aeth again, and the Princels hither.

The 7th instant the French Court removed from Aeth, their Majesties intending to be that night at Queinay, and fo to proceed on their way to St. Germain; the Army which still continues to work at the Fortifications there, it is faid, may be fuddainly leparated, and put into feveral Garrilons, to refresh themselves after their great fatigue and labour.

Hague, July 10. His Highness the Prince of Orange according to our last advice from Berlin, was gone with his Electoral Highness higher up into che Country, to hunt at Cujiryn: Telterday the Count de Solms, together with the Velt Marshal Warts, arrived here from Utrecht. The Heer Pompone, having remained here for leveral days incognito, is finally gone for Amsterdam, from whence his Excellency intends to pals by lea for Sweden. We are told, that the Prince Elector Palatine, hath by Letters acquainted the States General of the Marriage concluded between his eldeft Son, and the Prin-

cefs of Danemark. Paris, Iuly 15. The 8. inftant dyed at St Germains, the young Duke d'Anjou; to the great Grief of their Majefties and the whole Court.

Whitehal, July 8. On thurfday the 6 inftant in the morning, His Majefty, accompanied by his Royal Highnefs, and his Highnefs Prince Report, being a t-inded by fiveril of the Nobility and other Perfons of quality, arrived here from Windfor; whither His Majefty together with his Royal Highnefs returned again in the evening.
