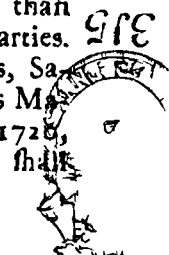
**L**AST Week the Archbishop of Toledo went to the Escorial, to lay before the King the Account he had received from Rome, of the Progress made in the Process begun by the Pope's Order against Cardinal Alberoni; and to desire on the Part of the Pope, that such Information on that Affair as can be given by the Ministers of this Court, and particularly by Father d'Aubenton his Majesty's Confessor, the Marquis de Tolosa Secretary of State, and Don Joseph de Patinno, may be transmitted thither. The Bishop of Pampelona, the new Inquisitor-General, is on his Way hither from Pampelona. Upon Advice that the Plague continues at Marseilles and thereabouts, repeated Orders have been sent to all the Ports, for using all Vigilance to prevent the coming in of any Vessels from the Levant without proper Certificates of Health; and the Governour of Barcelona has sent an Advice to Court, that a Catalonian Vessel which had touched at one of the Ports of Provence, had by his Order been stopped at the Entrance of the Harbour of Barcelona, and that he had caused the Crew of that Vessel to go with her to a Part of the Coast lying at a proper Distance from Barcelona, there to perform strict Quarantain.

*Venice Sept. 28.* Field-Marshal-General Schuylenbourg having taken Leave of the chief Persons of this State and foreign Ministers here, set out on the 25th Instant for Germany, to settle his private Affairs, and is expected back here the next Spring. It is advised from Bologna, that Sig. Aldobrandini the Pope's late Nuncio to this Republick, was arrived there; and was preparing to proceed on his Journey to Genoa, in order to embark there for Barcelona on his way to the Court of Madrid, whither the Pope has ordered him to repair with all Diligence. We have an Account from Brescia that

the Prince d'Otrajano with several Persons of his Retinue, had passed through that Place on his Return from Milan to Vienna. On the 26th Instant the only Son of the Procurator Giustiniani was married to a Lady of the Family of Barbarigo in the Palace of that Name, at which Ceremony the numerous Relations of both those Families made a splendid Appearance, and even the Doge himself was present wearing his Robe and Ducal Cap; the Matrimonial-Service was performed by Sig. Giustiniani Bishop of Murano Uncle of the Bridegroom.

*Genoa, Oct. 2.* The Magistrates of Health of this Republick had no Letters from their Consul at Marseilles by the two last Posts, so that at present all our Advices from the Neighbouring Parts of France are only from Aix and Nice: From which Places it is advised, that the contagious Distemper was encreased at Marseilles, that 4000 had died of it in two Days, that it was got to Aix, and several Villages thereabouts, as also in Salons, and into some Places of the Contat d'Avignon.

*Paris, Oct. 13.* Advice being come that there had been a Tumult at Lyons, which the Magistrates had appeased, it was thought fit however to order the Marshal Duke de Villeroy to go to his Government there, to prevent any further Disorders; and accordingly he went away Post this Morning. The Marshal de Montesquiou set out at the same time for his Government of Languedoc. This Day an Arrêt was published, declaring, that the Bank Bills shall no longer be received at any of the Offices for the King's Revenues, even for Taxes and Duties which became due between the 1st of January last and the Day of the Date of this Arrêt; nor pass current in Commerce in any Payments after the first of November next, otherwise than by free Consent between the Parties. Declaring further, that all Pensions, Salaries, and Contracts payable by his Majesty for his Service this Year 1720,



shall be paid in Money; that the Dividends on the Stock of the India Company shall be paid till the 1st of January next in Bank Bills of 100, of 50, and 20 Livres; but that the Annuities payable by that Company shall from the 1st of July last be paid in Money. Those who after the 1st of November shall be possessed of Bank Bills, are allowed to the End of that Month to employ the same in purchasing Annuities of several Kinds established by former Arrêts: But from the last of November all Bank-Bills are declared to be of no other Value or Use, than that of being converted into Actions of Annuities, or Tenths of Actions, created by an Arrêt of the 15th of September last. This Day likewise another Arrêt was published, declaring, that the Annuities payable at the Town-House of this City, shall from and after the 21st of this Month be paid in Money.

#### Admiralty-Office, Oct. 6, 1720.

Whereas an anonymous Letter, signed D. D. dated the 3d Instant, hath been sent to this Office, giving an Account of some Abuses committed in one of His Majesty's Ships of War; the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty do hereby give Notice, that if the Person who wrote the same will attend their Lordships and make good what is alleged, he shall have all fitting Encouragement and Protection.

This is to give Notice to all Masters and Commanders of Ships and Vessels, passing by Dover Harbour, that on the 10th of October 1720, there will be erected on the South Pier Head of the said Harbour, a Lanthorn Light by Night, and a Flag hoisted by Day, so soon as there shall be ten Foot Water on the Flood between the Pier Heads, and to continue until the Water is decreased on the Ebb to ten Foot, and then the said Light will be put out, or the said Flag struck, and this will be done all the Year round; the same Harbour being now very commodious for the Reception of trading Ships and Vessels, there being 13 Foot Water on Neap Tides, and upwards of 18 Foot on common Spring Tides.
