**A**N Express from the Marquess de Lede brought Yesterday the Account of 14 Battallions being landed at Ceuta, and that all possible Diligence was used to transport the rest of the Troops, both Horse and Foot, designed for the Expedition upon Africa. On the 25th past the King and Queen removed from the Escorial to Balsain; where they propose to stay about a Fortnight longer. The Marquess de Maulevrier arrived here last Night. The Abbot de Mornay, the late French Ambassadour at the Court of Lisbon, is arrived here from thence on his Return to Paris.

Berlin, Oct. 15. The King of Prussia arrived here on the 13th Instant from Potsdam, and Yesterday gave Audience to Count Posa, the Swedish Envoy, who appears extremely satisfied with the Dispositions in which he found his Majesty for cultivating and improving the Union which has been so happily re-established between the two Courts.

Paris, Oct. 22. It is advised from Rome, that the Pope has made a new Promotion of three Cardinals, viz. Sig. Barberigo Bishop of Verona, Father Cienfuegos a Spanish Jesuite, and Sig. Borgia Brother of the Duke of Gandia. The Count de Provana, Plenipotentiary from the King of Sardinia for the Congress at Cambray, has been here some Days; the Count de Stevan, the King of Spain's Plenipotentiary for the Congress, arrived here on the 14th. Sig. Pozzobueno, his Catholick Majesty's Minister to the King of Great Britain, is also arrived here on his Way to Hanover. He designed to have passed by Sea from Bayone to Holland, but did not find a Ship these in Readiness to take him on board. The Plague spreads in Provence, notwithstanding all the Precautions of the Government, and is said to have reached Apt, St. Tulle, and other Places on this Side the River Durance. A third Line is ordered to be thrown up, to hinder its infecting the Neighbouring Provinces.

Whitehall, Oct. 17. One of His Majesty's Messengers arrived Yesterday from the Gohte, with Letters of the 8th Instant, O. S. giving an Account, that upon the Receipt of a second Express from Great Britain, His Majesty immediately declared his Resolution of setting out from the Gohte the next Week in order to his return home, and of meeting the Parliament very early. Sir George Byng left the Gohte the 7th, and the Earl of Sunderland intended to set out from thence the 9th in order to return to Great Britain. This Express brought Orders for the Yachts and Convoy of Men of War which ate

to attend His Majesty in his Passage, to be sent away with all possible dispatch; and accordingly Sir John Jennings, who is to command them, went on board this Morning.

His Majesty has been pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood on Captain George Saunders, and Luke Schaub Esq.
