Toulon, October 23.

M Cassart is returned hither from his successful Expedition against the Moors. He had with him one 50 Gun Ship, one of 10 Guns, and two Barks, having on board 500 Land Soldiers. He is obliged to perform 20 Days Quarantine.

Copenhagen, Oct 22. The King of Denmark and the Prince Royal returned hither from Holstein on Saturday last. The Ratifications of the Treaty of Peace between this Court and Sweden were exchanged To-Day; and Orders are dispatched for the Evacuation of Stralsund, Pomerania, and Rugen, and of the Forts of Malstrand on the 12th of November, N. S. The Lord Carteret will set out in a few Days for Hanover.

Paris, Nov. 9. On the 6th Instant in the Morning, after the King's Levy, the Marshal de Villeroy went to Villeroy, his Country Seat, whence he returned last Night to the Tuilleries. The Cardinal de Rohan being arrived here on Thursday last, from his Country Seat of Saverne, went immediately to the Palais Royal, where he had a long Conference with the Duke Regent. The Cardinal de Noailles is likewise come back from Mont-Carmel, where he has been for some time to perform his Devotions. It does not yet appear that his Prelate has consented to the Publication of his Mandate about the Pope's Constitution. A Courier arrived here some Days ago from Rome, with the Pope's Bulls for the Duke of Chartres to hold both the great Masterships of St. Lazarus and of Mont-Carmel; and that Prince will accordingly take the usual Oaths to the King on Sunday next. M. de Fourbin de Janfon, Archbishop of Arles, died here on the 6th Instant in a very advanced Age. It is advised from Marseilles by Letters of the 24th past, that the Plague had almost ceased there; and that the Inhabitants, who had retired to the Bastides, were preparing to return to that City.

Paris, Nov. 11. Three French Ships, fitted out and laden at the Expence of private Persons of St. Malo, went thence lately to the River of Plata; where their Men landing fell to hunting the wild Bulls of the Country, and carrying on a clandestine Trade with the Colony of St. Sacrament: But the Governour of those Parts drawing together some Troops, drove them away with the Loss of about 150 Men. The Ships are come back to St. Malo, and have brought with them a good Number of Hides. The latest Advices from Provence, tell us the Violence of the Plague is abated, and that the Contagion does not spread much: So that the cold Weather coming on, it is hoped it will not be communicated on this Side the

Rivers Rhone and Isere, which are well guarded to prevent any one's passing over from the infected Countries.
