Stockholm, October 19.

ON the 17th Instant, about Five in the Evening, young Count Teflin arrived here in four Days from Copenhagen, with his Danish Majesty's Ratification of the Peace lately concluded between Sweden and Denmark; it happened to be the usual Court-Day, and there was a more than ordinary Appearance at the Palace that Evening, when the King and Queen were complimented on this Occasion by the Senators, Foreign Minifters, and other Persons of Distinction; and this Day at Noon the Peace was proclaimed with the usual Solemnities in all the Publick Places of this City. Yesterday, before Noon, Sir John Norris took his Leave of this Court in order to his Return homewards, on which Occasion his Swedish Majesty took a rich Sword he then wore, and presented it to him. This Morning early, that Admiral went down to the Dahlers, in order to go to Sea with the first fair Wind; the largest Ships are already fallen down to Elfnab, a Place about seven Leagues nearer the Sea than the Dahlers. On the 17th, the Muscovite Adjutant-General Romantof was conducted with his Retinue from hence by a Lieutenant and 12 Dragoons towards Grislehaven, where a Swedish Brigantine lies ready to carry him to Abo in Finland. It is said, he had a Present made him of Gold Medals, to the Value of 2000 Rixdollars.

Paris, Nov. 13. The Parliament which was to assemble Yesterday Morning at Pontoise, has been transferred to Blois, each Member of that Company having received a Lettre de Cachet, enjoining them to meet there the 2d of December next. This is so much the more surprising, because the Accommodation between the Court and them was looked upon to be in a manner concluded; but is attributed to their persisting to refuse to register the King's Letters Patents concerning the Pope's Constitution, and to the Endeavours they have lately used to oppose the Measures of the Court in relation to the Bank and

the India Company. It is believed that the Chamber of Justice, which was established here during the Vacation, will continue their Sessions, and decide all such Causes as were used to be brought before the Parliament. The Abbot Pucelle, Counsellour of the Parliament, has been banished by a Lettre de Cachet, to Fontarabia; which is imputed to his having spoken very freely against the Accommodation upon the Constitution at the last Meeting of the Sorbonne on the 1st Instant. The Plague has considerably abated in Provence, and particularly at Aix and Marseilles, and 'tis not doubted but the approaching Winter will put an entire Stop to it. The time for depositing the Actions of the India Company in the Bank has been prolonged by an Arrêt of the 9th of November, to the 23d. Another Arrêt has been published annulling all the Bank Bills of 1000 and 10000 Livres, which are not employed at the End of this Month in the Manner prescribed by former Arrêts; which has increased the Discount upon those Bills.
