To the King's most Excellent Majesty, The humble Address of the Chancellour, Matters, and Scholars of the University of Cambridge.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

MIDST the general Joy of your Subjects for your Majesty's fate and happy Arrival in your Kingdoms, we beg Leave to approach your Royal Presence with the most fincere Expressions of our Duty and Affection.

Loyalty and Obedience are justly due from all your Subjects, but they are tied with greater Force and Energy upon us, who are under the additional

Obligations of Gratitude.

It is from your Majesty's wife and happy Administration that we in common with others enjoy our Protection and Security, the Benefit of good Laws, and the quiet Possession of our Liberties and Properties; but it is to your Majesty's Royal and unparallelled Bounty, that we particularly owe that noble Provifion for the Advancement both of Piety and Learning which your Majesty has graciously bestowed upon this ancient Nursery of them both, and those late repeated Marks of your Royal Favour which claim our present most grateful Acknowledgments.

To have been the great Assertor of the Liberties of Europe, the chief Protector and Defender of the Protestant Religion in general, and of the Church of England in particular, are the known Titles and Encomiums of our gracious Sovereign; and that your Majesty has likewise been the great Patron of Learning, will add no fmall Lustre to the Annals of your Reign, and continue your Memory to endless Genes
