New-York, September 24.

William Burnet, Esq; Captain General and Governour in Chief of His Majesty's Provinces of New-York and New-Jersey arrived here from England on the 16th Instant; and according to Form published his Commission for this Province here on the 17th, and that for New Jersey at Perth-Amboy on the 23d.

Berlin, Nov. 26. On the 23d Instant in the Evening, the King of Prussia arrived here. On the 24th, the Lord Whitworth, the King of Great Britain's Minister Plenipotentiary, and Ambassadour extraordinary for the ensuing Congress at Brunswick, had Audience of his Prussian Majesty, to whom he presented a Letter from the King his Master. His Lordship was very graciously received by his Prussian Majesty, who took that Occasion to give him new Assurances of his Resolution to maintain inviolably his Friendship with His Britannick Majesty, and to proceed in Concert with him in whatever relates to the Security of the Protestant Religion in the Empire. On the 21st Count Rhotembourg set out for France. When he had his Audience of Leave of the King at Wusterhausen, he desired his Majesty in the Regent's Name, to recal the Prussian Resident at Paris, M. Sallentin, who by his ill Behaviour had rendered himself disagreeable to his Royal Highness. The King not only granted his Request, but immediately dispatched the necessary Orders for it, declaring at the same Time his Intention to send in his room another Person who may be more acceptable to the Court of France. On the 15th Instant, M. Alderfeldt, the Swedish Commissary, began to take Possession of Rugen, and Stralsund, in Consequence of the late Treaty of Peace, by receiving from the Danes the Magazine of that Town, till the Troops from Sweden, which were expected every Day, should arrive there to relieve the Danish Garrison. This Court received Advice on the 20th Instant, that the Electoral Princess of Saxony was happily brought to Bed of a Prince.

Paris, Dec. 4. The Number of vacant Benefices increasing daily, the Duke Regent began Yesterday to dispose of several of them, and will continue so to do till they are filled up. There have been above 3000 Petitions presented to the Regent for those Preferments, and the Abbot Thefus is appointed to lay them before his Royal Highness. The Abbot de Buffy is named to go to Rome in the Place of M. de Lassitau, who has hitherto had the Care of the Affairs of France at that Court. We do not hear that any thing has been done yet at Pontoise wth relation to the Registering of the King's Letters Patents touching the Constitution. It is said the Parliament is much divided on that Account, the Great Chamber and that of the Inquests being for Registering the said Declaration with certain Modifications, and that of the Requests refusing to comply with the Demands of the Court on any Terms; unless the King revokes his Letters Patents, by which the Great Council was authorized to register his Majesty's Declaration concerning the Accommodation of the Bishops, and which they look upon to be contrary to their Privileges and antient Constitutions. The Count de Ribeyra, who has resided here some Time in the Quality of Ambassadour Extraordinary from the King of Portugal, is gone from hence on his Return to Lisbon. Don Lewis d'Acunha, Ambassadour Plenipotentiary from the said Court for the ensuing Congress, is arrived here, and prepares to set out within a few Days for Cambray, where he expects to find Count Tarouca his Colleague. M. Nerault, one of the Keepers of the King's Wardrobe, went thither some Days ago, with Furniture for the Apartments of the Town-House, where the Ministers are to meet. On Sunday last Joseph Levy, a rich Jew, was baptized at the Chapel of the Tuilleries, the King doing him the Honour to be Godfather, and the Dutchess of Ventadour Godmother. The Ceremony was performed by the Cardinal de Rohan. The Bank continues to redeliver the Actions of the

India Company to the Proprietors with a new Stamp put to them; but it does not appear yet that any conform themselves to the late Arrêt for advancing 100 Livres in Specie and 50 in Bank Notes upon every Action; and it is generally believed that Arrêt will not be put in Execution.

Whitehall, November 29.

The Squadron of His Majesty's Ships commanded by Sir John Norris, is arrived at the Nore. In the Voyage from the Bulrick His Majesty's Ship the Monk struck on the Corton Sand off Yarmouth, but beat over it with the Flood, and came to an Anchor in five Fathom Water within the Sand.
