Flymouth, July 17.

Is Majefly, together with his Royal High-nefs, and his Ilighnefs Prince Rupert, attended by feveral of the chiefeft of the Nobility, arriving on Thuis-day the 13 initant at Portf outh, that afternoon was pleased to visit the Ships in the Port, and especially the new Ship called the Great James, and the next morning wert thence in his Yachts to Tarmouth in the Ifle of Wight, where His Majefty arrived about two a clock in the afternoon, being faluted by all the Guns in the Caltle, and received by Sir Robert Holmes, Governor of the Int of Wight, by whom His Majefty, his Royal Highnefs, and his Highnels Prince Rupert, 2s likewileahe rest of the Nobility that attended H15 Majesty, were treated at a very noble and plentiful Dinner ; atter which, His Majesty, accompanied by his Royal Highness, was pleased to visit some part of the Island on Horseback, and the next Morning to goe and see Hurst-Castle presuring again about Noon', when His Majesty, and Royall Highness, were again, together with the Nobility that attendeds them, enpertained by Sir Robert Halmes at a very Noble Dinner prepared in a large Tent erected for that purpole; that Afternoon his Majefly and Royal Highness, were pleased to go on board their Yachs again, and about eight at night arrived at St. Hplens, where the Forefight | Diamond, Swallow, Affurance and Greenwich Frigats lay ready to attend bis Majefly to the Westward, whither they all failed that night with a Northerly wind ; the next day the wind was calm and not so favorable, and this day his Majefty together with his Royal Highness, about 6. a clock in the evening arrived in this Por, haveing been met by the Right Honorable the Earl of Bath the Governor, in his Shalop, and faluted by all the Cannon of the Cittadels and Forts; infi ite numbers of People in the mean time crouding the Shore.

Milan, July 1. On Mooday last our Governor, together with his Lady, accompanied by several persons of quality, went to pass some days in the Country, from whence we expect they may return again to morrow or n xrday.

By Letters from Final of the 24th path, we are told, that the day before, there parted out of the River of *Vado*, Nine French Galleys, under the command of Monlieur *de Visogne*, but that the weather proving had, and the Wind high and contrary, they were forced to pat in again. Rathbonne, Fuly 9. The Affairs at this Dict progeed yey i flowly: Yellerday was at length coneluded the buffinels concerning the regulating of Money for the future in the Empire, and especially of Rixdollars, in which it seems hath been found great abuses.

The Bishop of Aiclfials, Commissioner for th Emperor, at the Diet, is suddenly expected in Town again.

We are told that at Sm4ben, Franchf.rt, and other places, they continue with much diligence the Levies for the Emperors tervice.

Venice, July 10. By Letters arrived this week from Procurator Nanz, Commuffioner from this States, for the adjuiling the matter of the Limits in Dalmatia, we are told, that all things in those parts continue in a very quiet and peaceable condition; and that he was making neceflary pieparations for his journey to Cliffz, where he is to meet with the Baffa of Boffina, appointed on the part of the Grand Signior, to treat with him about those affairs.

We have advice of the Turkish Fleet having been lately seen near *Fuglia*, though without doing the leaft harm as we can yet hear of, in those or other parts this Summer, except the surprising of some Vessels belonging to those Countries, as are not in amity with the Port.

We discourse here very variously at present of the Grand Signiors March; some say, it is towards Sqphia, others towards Belgrade, though all agree, that his Army will be far greater then was formerly thought it would have been; and it is much feared, be may after all, attempt something in Polando or Hungary this Summer, though we seen here to have great reason to hope he will not.

This Senate hath, avis faid, fent directions to General Barbaro in Dalmana, to repair for twith to Iftria, for the adjufting fome differences there, and for the affigning to the Greeks who tame from Candia, their feveral proportions of Lands and Houles, a thing which will very much contribute to the quiet of those parts; Signor Giorgio Morofini, who is appointed to fucceed the faid General Barbaro in Dalmatia, is preparing for his journey thither, and as is thought, may depart from hence, about the beginning of the next week; the Galley which is touranfport him, and all other things being in a perfect readines.

Heidetbergh, fuly 12. The eighth inflant in the evening arrived here the Marquels de Grand from Menra, and was lodged that night in the Caffle by order of his Electoral Highness, of whom he had audience the next morning, concerning Affairs of very great importance; having flaid there that day, the next, he parted again for Menta, intending to proceed with all imaginable haft from thence to Cologne, to renew again the Conferences between the Deputies of the Respective Mediators, which fince the absence of the faid Marquels have been difcontinued.

Our Advices received lately from thence, give us little entouragement to hope for any fuccefs in the concluding of those affairs, that Elector infifting fill on his first demands, which the Town hath declared they cannot agree to

From Sarwaerden, we are told, that the Mareshal de Crequi, was come to encamp with his forces near that place.

Warfatr Fuly 13. From Lemburgh of the 26th instant inftant they write; that the Tartars had lately made another incurfion into those Frontier Countries, and besides the other dammages they had done, had carryed away with them several Thousand of those poor Inhabitants, together with their Cattle, and what of their goods they could make portable; but that the Nobility thereabouts, having upon the Allarme gathered together into a sufficient Body, went immediately in pursuit of this Band of Robbers, whom they overtook as they were dividing their plunder, without the leass they were dividing their plunder, without the least apprehension of their approach, and so in no condition to receive an Enemy; the Poles making use of the advantage, together with the afsistance of those Christian Slaves the Tartars were carrying away, foon routed them, and besides the goods and people they recovered again, took about 1000 horses; of the Tartars one hundred onely escaped, the rest were either taken or flain.

We are told, that there are on their way hither, Four Deputies from Hanenko, one of the Generals of the Coffacks; that their errand is to defire his Majefty to fend with all the haft that may be, fufficient Forces into the Ukrain, to joyn with those under his command, for the fecuring that Country, (against the defignes and practices of Dorofensko) under the Obedience of the Crown of Poland.

Francfort, July 19. The French Forces lye still encamped on the Sarre, as we are told, expecting the arrival of several Troops out of Flanders to joyn with them. All the discourse here is at prefent concerning the affairs of Cologne, and the common report spcaks of nothing but a rupture.

Cologne, July 21. Here is a report as if Colonel Kilmanicc, who formerly ferved in Candia, was coming hither with two Regiments from the Emperor, ro be employed for the defence of this place. Our Treaty remains in one pofture, though in the interim our Fortifications advance better, and are now almost finished. Our Magisfrates are full raising of Men, and laying up Provisions of Corn, and other necessaries; so that if all means for an accommodation fail, we hope we shall at least be in a condition to defend our felves. The Marquess de Grana is returned hither again.

Hamburgh, July 21. The Dukes of Lunenburgh have disbanded feveral Troops, fome of which are fince come to take fervice here: In the interim our Magistrates are very active in feeing everything put into a posture of defence, and omit nothing which may add to the fecurity of the place. There is at prefent in the Town 800 new raifed men, to whom Arms are giving out, and more men raifing: On the Fortifications they work with all imaginable diligence. It hath been reported for fome days, that the Danish Fleet was out, but proves to have been without any ground.

Letters from Mosko of the 18th of June, confirm what was faid in our last concerning Stephen Radzin, having been brought prisoner thither, and there executed by the Czurs order.

Lisbonne, June 22 Two days fince there was here an Auto du F?; the number of the Jews that came out of the Inquisition was about fourescore, whereof two were burnt, the rest being otherwise dispos d of.

We are told of an Order of the Council of State pail the 18th inftant, by which it is faid, it is ordered, Thatall those that for the future come out of the Inqu fition, profest Jews, shall be banished; and that if any Gentleman shall hereafter marry into the Family of a new Chrillian, whose Ancestors were Jews, he shall lose his Gentility.

Yesterday Monsteur St. Romain, Ambassador from his most Christian Majesty, zook his leave of the Prince Regent, and atterwards of the Queen, being conducted to his Audience by the Marquis de Marialva; it is reported that Monsteur Verjeux, is appointed by that King to fucceed here with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary.

The Popes Nuncio hath not yet had his publick Audience, but may in a day or two, in the mean time he hath performed the Ceremony of Confecration of the Archbishop of Goa, the Bishop of Aguarda, and the Bishop of Leiria, who have fince likewife Confecrated the Bishop of Martiria, and the Bishop of Vijeu.

Bruffels, July 22. The Cavalry which of late were quartered about this place, are now marching to their former quarters again. We have advice from Aeth, that there is at prefent in Garrifon onely one French Regiment of Foot, three Companies of Swiffers, and one Troop of Horfe. The Spanish Infantry which were lately fent from hence to Mons, are ordered to return hither again. His Excellency the Count de Monterey went hence on Munday last, to visit Mons, Valenciennes, Condè, and feveral other places in those parts; and at the fame time likewise parted the Duke de Villa Hermosa General of the Cavalry by his Excellencies order for Leeuwe, to fee the Fortifications and all other things be in a good condition there. The Count Marcya is gone to Namur upon the same account.

Paris, fuly 23. The Kings journey to Rochefort and Rochelle, intended to have been about the middle of the next Month, is now faid to be wholly off again. On Munday next the King goe sto Verfailles, and from thence the week following to Fontainbleau, where his Majesty purposes not to pass above 14 days at farthest.

Monfieur Courtin defigned Ambalfador to the States General of the United Provinces, will not, it is faid, part fo foon on that employment, as was at first thought; and in the mean time the King hath appointed the Sieur Bernard, at prefent at the Hague, to take care of his affairs there.

Hague, to take care of his affairs there. Hague, July 24. The 22. inftant in the morning his Highnels the Prince of Orange returned hither again in perfect health; his Highnels had received a flight hurt in his face, by the overturning of his Coach in his journey, but not at all confiderable.

On Sunday last the Velt Marshal Warz went back for Hirecht, and yesterday returned again to this place, which hath occasioned a general dilcourle of the forming very fuddainly a Flying Army, fo often spoken of, which is to be encamped on the *Rbyne*. Here are Letters in Town which speak of Monsieur de Groots arrival at the French Court. Colonel Bampfield is still here, and hath made his report to the States General of the prefent posure of affairs relating to the Town of Cologne, whither he is returning again in a day or two. The States of Holland are still assessed by a sis faid. may part again about the beginning of the next week. This day the Heer vin Odyke arrived here from Zealand, the States of that Province being separated again. From Bilevelt they write, that the States Allembled there for the Circle of Westphalia, have resoured to the Countries.

From Cologn our Letters tell us, that they have now quite layd afide all hopes of an accommodation, and are providing for their own defence and fecurity.

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
