Stockholm, January 4.

ON the 24th past M. Hopken, who was Resident from this Crown at the Court of Vienna, arrived here very unexpectedly from thence, without having had Permission from the King to leave his Post. The next Morning he was sent for to attend the King and Senate, and was examined upon what Inducements he came away without having first obtained Leave. And not being able to justify himself, he was ordered to be taken into Custody. - On New Year's-Day there was a very numerous Appearance at the Royal Palace, when the King and Queen received the usual Compliments of the Day, and in the Evening there was a Ball at Court. The King will shortly make a Progress to Gottenbourg, and from thence into Schonen; and his Majesty designs to take a View of such Regiments as can conveniently be drawn together on the Way both going and coming. Two Days ago Major-General Tohrnslycht, Brother of the Countess Piper, and Colonel of the Foot-Guards, was declared Chief Gentleman of the Bed-Chamber to the King.

Copenhagen, Jan. 25. The Evacuation of Pomerania and Rugen and the Fortrefs of Stralsund was made on the 17th of this Month. Yesterday arrived here the Regiment of Count Wedle consisting of two Battallions, with a Company belonging to the Artillery, which with some-Squadrons of Horse that march over Land to Holstein, are all the Troops the King of Denmark had left in Pomerania. The King of Denmark with the Prince Royal went on the 21st Instant to Fredericksbourg, and will return hither on the 29th.

Hague, Feb. 4. The Commissioners of the Admiralties have been here several Days, and had frequent Conferences with the States General upon the Project of farming their Customs; as also upon a Design of fitting out this Year a Squadron of eight Men of War to act against the Pyrates of Barbary. The States of the Province of Holland are summoned to assemble here on the 13th Instant, when it is expected the said Project relating to the Customs will be finally settled or rejected. We have Advice from Dresden, that the young Prince of Saxony died on the 22d past. M. Goes whom the States have appointed to go to the Court of Denmark, is preparing to set out for Copenhagen in a few Days.

Paris, Feb. 5. Two Arrêts were published this Day, in Pursuance of the Resolutions taken in the Council of Regency the 26th past; the one importing, that the India Company shall be accountable for all the Proceedings and Debts of the Bank, which was united to the said Company by an Arrêt of the 23d of February 1720; the other directing all the Contracts for Annuities upon the Town-House, and other Funds, as likewise all Bank Notes, Actions of the India Company, and all other Paper Effects, to be brought in within two Months, in order to their being examined by Commissioners appointed for that Purpose. On the 1st Instant the Syndick of the Sorbonne received a Lettre de Cachet, ordering the Faculty to re-admit at their Assembly of that Day the twenty two Doctors, who were formerly expelled on Account of their adhering too zealously to the Pope's Constitution; which Letter being read by the Syndick, and the Faculty going to deliberate upon it, the said twenty two Doctors forced open the Doors, and took their Places; upon which the Syndick remonstrated to them, that they ought to retire till the Faculty had come to a Resolution, but they not complying, he declared to them he must otherwise dissolve the Assembly, which accordingly he did. It is expected that the Court will renew their Orders upon this Subject the next Assembly. It is now said the Cardinal de Rohan will set out shortly for Alsatia in order to regulate his Affairs there, after which he is to proceed to Rome by the Way of Switzerland. The King has for some Days past been indisposed with a Cold and the Tooth ach, upon which Account a Ball for his Majesty's Entertainment, which was appointed on the 1st Instant at the Tuilleries, has been put off. The Dutchess Dowager of Orleans is likewise confined to her Chamber by Indisposition, as is also the Duke of Chartres.
