

The States of Upper Hungary have, as is said, refused to receive the Emperors late Edict, for the granting a general Pardon for all crimes and misdemeanors committed by any of the Nobility during the late rebellion, allcading themselves to be altogether innocent of any such thing, and so not to need any pardon. The Commission at Presburgh is continued till the 16th instant.

*Marseilles, July 14.* By Letters from Spain we are informed, that the Corsairs of Sally, have of late been very busie about the Straights-mouth; that they have Nine Sayl aboard in course, and Five more at home in Port, two whereof carrying 18 and 20 Guns apiece, and the rest from 8 to 12 Guns apiece.

It is said, that two French Frigats have lately destroyed two of their best Ships, but of this we expect a farther confirmation. Some days since sayled out of this Port four French Gallies, and three Galliot; three Gallies more will follow in a day or two; we are told, they are to joyn with the other Gallies at present abroad, under the command of Monsieur de Vivogne, upon what design we know not, though some speak, as if they were to be employed against Tunis or Tripoli; which is the rather believed here, seeing we are informed by a Bark lately arrived from the Coast of Barbary, that in their way hither, they met 13 French men of War, bound from Thoulon for Tripoli.

We have advice that Sir Edward Spragge is passed by with the Fleet under his command for Tripoli, to confirm and ratify the Articles of Peace, His Majesty of England hath with those people.

*Copenhagen, July 16.* This day the young Electoral Prince Palatine went hence on his way home, having been treated the time of his being here, with all extraordinary kindness and respect.

The 24th of August the Princesse of Denmark, contracted to this Prince, is to part hence for Harburgh, where she will be received by the Dutchess of Osnaburgh, and by her conducted to Heidelberg, in order to the solemnising the Marriage there. The men of War which it was reported were designed for the River Elbe, are still here, and onely expect orders to sayl; it is said, that the King has intentions of going very suddainly to Norway, and that these men of War, are to attend him in his passage thither.

*Hamborough, July 21.* We begin to be at present eased of some of our fears, and to be better satisfied in the intentions of our Neighbours then formerly, however we continue to work on our Fortifications, with all the vigour and diligence imaginable, to raise Men, and to lay up a Provision of Corn, and other necessaries for two years; our new Leavies amount at present to 800 Men, who have all received Arms, and are divided into several Companies, under the command of good experienced Officers.

Our Letters from Mosko certainly assure us, that Stephan Radzin having been surpris'd by a party of Cossacks, who inhabit on the River Dona, was by them brought Prisoner to Moskow, and there, as hath been said, executed; which they tell with all the circumstances of his death, so that there seems to be little room left for any doubt.

*Paris, July 23.* Some days since returned hither Monsieur de Louvois from Lorraine, where he had been to confer, as is said, concerning several matters with the Marechal de Crequi. The 20th instant was celebrated in the usual manner at Val de Grace, the Anniversary of the late Queen Mother, where the Duke of Orleans, with several persons of the chiefest quality were present.

We are told of Commissions that are giving out for the raising in this Kingdom, several Regiments

both of Horse and Foot. From Cologne our Letters tell us, that the Mediators having had several conferences for the adjusting the differences depending between that Town and their Elector, and observing the little success their endeavors in that matter had hitherto met with, by reason of the obstinacy they found in both parties to adhere to their first pretensions, had resolved to refer the whole affair to the determination of the States Assembled for the Circle of Westphalia.

From Vienna they write, that the Emperor being much dissatisfied with the slow proceeding of the Dyet at Ratisbonne, in the publick concerns of the Empire, and especially in that of the Publick security, had thoughts of Summoning a general Assembly of the Princes of the Empire to be held at Ratisbonne, the 25 of August next, and with them in Person finally to conclude those affairs, which so particularly regard the good of the whole Empire.

*Brussels, July 24.* On Monday last his Excellency the Count de Monterey, attended by his ordinary Guards, went hence for Mons in Haynault, where his Excellency arrived that day in the Evening; being received by the Duke d'Aerscht Governor of that Province, at the Gates of that place: from thence his Excellency went to visit Conde, Valenciennes, &c. and to morrow is expected here again. At the same time parted hence the Count Marcy for Namur, to visit the Fortifications of that place; and the Duke de Villa Hermosa for Leeuwe, to see every thing be in a good condition there.

From Cologne they write, That the Deputies of the respective Mediators, finding how unsuccessfully they have hitherto laboured for the composing those differences, have of late forbore from all farther Conferences concerning those matters; in the mean time all the discourse is of a rupture, and therefore they omit not to make there a timely provision, in case things should come so far.

*Cologne, July 24.* It has been lately reported here, That the Lunenbourg's Troops were passing over into the service of our Elector, which hath much alarmed us; though we since find it to have been wholly a mistake.

Our Treaty is now quite at a stand, the many difficulties which daily arise in those Affairs, having quite disheartned the Mediators from further proceeding in it; all our consultations here are now how best to provide for our security and defence: two Companies of Train Bands work constantly, besides the other Soldiery, on the Fortifications, and continue on the Watch two days together, when they are relieved by two other Companies.

*Hague, July 28.* The 20th instant Don Emanuel de Lyra arrived here from Brussels, and having been some days in Town incognito, is returned thither again, to confer with his Excellency concerning some matters relating to his Embassy here; it is thought he will be here again very suddenly from thence, to take upon him his Publick Character.

Collonel Bampfield continues still in Town; here is a report as if some Forces were going hence for Cologne, but of this we very shortly expect to hear the further certainty.

Prince Maurits is at present at Cleve, and is in few dayes expected here from thence.

It is said that Monsieur Meerman is to go Ambassador to the Crown of Sweden.

*London, July 23.* Yesterday in the Evening, Her Majesty, attended by several of the principal Ladies of her Court, arrived at Somersets house from Hampton-Court, whither Her Majesty returned again this evening.
