Do in justice to our Sovereign as well as to our sellow Subjects, most humbly represent to your Majetry, that Edward Witherston, Esq; High Sherist of the County of Hereford, has always been esteemed a Person zealous for the present Establishment in Church and State, and so remarkably distinguished for his constant Affection to your Majetry, that those who have no Knowledge of his Person, are no Strangers to that Part of his Character; that he has always, as a Magistrate, as far as ever we have has always, as a Magistrate, as far as ever we have heard, been free from the least Imputation of any traiterous Relaxation of the Laws against your Matraiterous Relaxation of the Laws against your Majestly's Enemies, or of being seduced into any arbitrary or illegal Measures, by the strongest Temptations of Fear or Interest; and that we believe he has neither prossituted the Safety and Honour of his Sovereign, or the Liberty and Property of his fellow Subjects, but has always used the Power with which he has been intrusted with a Fidelity becoming an upright Magistrate for the Support of your sacred Person and Government. Paris, March 1. Yesterday Morning Intimation was given to the Parliament to proceed no further in the Caufe depending before them concerning the Duke de la Force, the King having taken the Cognizance of it to himself and Privy Council: Whereupon the Parliament, at which were present the Dukes and Peers, and Princes of the Blood, resolved to send a Department to the King to represent the ill to fend a Deputation to the King to represent the ill Consequences of that Proceeding, and to desire his Majesty to revoke the said Order. It is not yet known what Answer will be made to these Reprefentations; however, the Duke still continues in Town, contrary to what was reported of his having received a Lettre de Cacher to retire into the Country.

Hague, March 4. Notwithstanding the Divisions between the great and little Towns of Holland which have hitherto obstructed the Design of sitting out a Squadron this Spring for the Streights, the States General finding it absolutely necessary to enter into some Measures for prorecting their Trade against the Algerines and other Barbarians, resumed that Marter some Days ago, and having again sent for their Admiralties, as also for their chief Sea Officers, they have appointed a Committee to confer with them on that Affair; and they have been confulting upon it several Days, in order to its being laid zegain before the States of this Province which are to meet on the 15th Instant.
