**A P R O C L A M A T I O N,**

**W** Hereas William late Marquess of Anandale was duly elected and returned to be one of the sixteen Peers of Scotland, to sit in the House of Peers of this present Parliament of Great Britain, and is since deceased; in order to the electing another Peer of Scotland to sit in his Room, we do, by the Advice of our Privy-Council, issue forth this our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holyrood-House in Edinburgh, on the first Day of June next ensuing, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and choose another Peer of Scotland to sit and Vote in the House of Peers of this present Parliament of Great Britain, in the Room of the said Marquess of Anandale deceased, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the Proxies for such as shall be absent, such Proxies being Peers, and producing a Mandate in Writing duly signed before Witnesses, and both the Constituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law. And the Lord Clerk Register, or such two of the Principal Clerks of the Session, as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their Votes; and immediately after such Election made, and duly examined, to certify the Name of the Peer so elected, and sign and attest the same in the Presence of the said Peers, and return such Certificate into our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And we strictly charge and command, that this our Royal Proclamation may be published at our Market-Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County-Towns of Scotland, twenty five Days at least before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the said Peers to proceed to such Election.

Given at our Court at St. James's, the Fifth Day of March 1720, in the Seventh Year of our Reign.

Paris, March 19. On Sunday last, the 16th Instant in the Afternoon, the Turkish Ambassadour made his Entry in the following Order: First the Officers of the Police followed by the Equipage of the Marquess de Remont, Introducer of Ambassadours, and that of the Marshal d'Etrées with a great Number of Servants and Led-Horses with very rich Houfings. After which came the Regiment of Dragoons of Orleans, followed by about 40 of the King's Grooms with Led-Horses. Then the Ambassadour's Retinue, consisting of about 32 Men of his Guards, 16 of them carrying Masquetoons upon their Shoulders, and as many with Lances, and four of the Ambassadour's Grooms with as many Led-Horses; after which the Ambassadour's Officers, among them his Son. Then came the Ambassadour on Horseback, having on his Right the Marshal d'Etrées, and on his Left his Interpreter, a great Number of the Ambassadour's and of the Marshal's Footmen walking on each Side, and followed by several Troops of the Cornette Blanche of the Regiment of Horse-Grenadiers, and that of the Collonel General; after which came several Coaches of the Kings, the Princes, and

Princesses of the Blood, and the whole was closed by a Company of the Marchausée. The King accompanied by the Duke Regent and the Princes and Princesses of the Blood, went to the Hotel de Bouffeurs in the Place Royale to see the Entry. That Ambassadour's Audience is fixed to the 21st Instant, the King's Household and other Troops having received Orders to be in a Readiness for that Solemnity. M. de Machault, Trudaine, and Fagon having been appointed to examine the late Petition of the India Company against its being made acceptable for the Bank Notes, the Marquesses de Bully and de Cartigny, two of the Syndicks of that Company, went to them, to desire them not to accept of that Commission; alledging, that as they have been always Enemies to that Company, the Publick would very much suspect the Justice of their Report; which Step so much displeased the Duke Regent, that on 17th Instant he committed the two Syndicks to the Bastille. Sir Luke Schaub arrived here on the 17th at Night from England, and was Yesterday at Court. It is advised from Provence, that the Plague is remarkably abated at Aix and Tarrascone since the late cold Weather, which has very much purified the Air.

**Wine-Licence-Office, March 9, 1720.**

His Majesty's Commissioners for managing the Duties arising from Wine-Licences, give Notice, that constant Attendance is given at their Office in Arundel-Street in the Strand, for the Dispatch of the Business thereof, on Tuesday days, Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays in the Forenoon, (excepting Holidays;) and whereas His Majesty's said Commissioners have received certain Information of divers Persons presuming to retail Wine without Licence, and to whom Letters have been sent, advertising them of the Penalties incurred thereby; and whereas His Majesty's said Commissioners do hereby give Notice, that unless such Persons do speedily apply themselves to the said Commissioners, the Laws in such Cases made and provided will be forthwith put in Execution.

Whereas the Commissioners appointed by a late Act of Parliament for Rebuilding the Parish Church of St. Martin in the Fields, in the City of Westminster, did, in the Gazette, on or about the 23d of July last publish, that the said Parish Church was to be taken down and rebuilt, and that there were in the said Church Monuments belonging to several noble and ancient Families, and did then give Notice, that any Person or Persons who should think themselves concerned to preserve any of the said Monuments, might, upon Application to the said Commissioners at the Vestry-Room of the said Parish, have full Liberty and Licence to take down such Monuments at their own proper Costs and Charges; and likewise, that all Persons should have three Months Notice in the Gazette of the Time wherein the said Church should be taken down in order to be rebuilt: The said Commissioners do therefore hereby give Notice, that they do intend to begin to take down the said Church, on or about the 25th of June next, in order to rebuild the same; and that all Persons who shall or may think themselves concerned to preserve any of the said Monuments, shall, upon Application to the said Commissioners in the Vestry Room of the said Parish, at any time before the said 25th of June next, have full Liberty and Licence to take down such Monuments at their own proper Costs and Charges.
