Stockholm, February 22.

THE King returned to Town on the 15th Instant in the Evening. His Majesty went no further than the Town of Abroga, where and at Westraas he reviewed some Troops of the Regiments of Life-Guards. The same Night Count Taube Governour of this City arrived here from Hambourg, as did also Baron Degenfeldt from Cassel. Some Days ago Auditor General Dahlman returned from Petersbourg, and brought Advice, that his Czarish Majesty had declared himself not only desirous to settle a Cartel for the Exchange of Prisoners, but also to conclude a Cessation of Arms between the two Kingdoms: And his Swedish Majesty being no less inclined thereto, has been pleased, for negotiating this important Affair with Plenipotentiaries from the Czar, to name and appoint Count Lillienstedt and Baron Stromfelt to be his Plenipotentiaries: And accordingly they are to go over forthwith to meet the Russian Plenipotentiaries at Neustadt near Abo in Finland.

Stockholm, March 1. M. Brandt, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Prussia, arrived here two Days ago. Some Officers of the Court are gone from hence towards Schongn, in order to meet Prince George of Hesse, his Swedish Majesty's younger Brother, and attend him hither: He is expected in six or eight Days at furthest.

Paris, March 26. The Turkish Ambassadour had on Sunday last, the 23d Instant, his Audience of the Duke Regent, to which he was conducted in the following Manner: The Coach of M. de Maupré, Introducer to his Royal Highness: A Detachment of the Regiment of Dragoons of Orleans, followed by 36 of the Duke Regent's Footmen: 20 of his Royal Highness's Pages on Horseback, and a

great Number of Grooms with Led-Horses: The Ambassadour's Retinue, without Muskets or Lances: The Ambassadour himself on Horseback, accompanied by M. de Maupré: A second Detachment of the Regiment of Orleans: The Duke and Dutcheis of Orleans's Coaches: A third Detachment of the same Regiment closed the Rear. His Royal Highness received the Ambassadour in his Gallery, where was a great Concourse of Persons of Quality and Distinction; and after the Audience he was re-conducted in his Royal Highness's Coach of State to the Hotel of Ambassadours, being a little indisposed. To Morrow he is to have his Audience of the Archbishop of Cambray as first Minister of State for Foreign Affairs: After which he will go to see the Opera of Theseus, the Amphitheatre being prepared for him and his Retinue. Several Apartments are fitting up at Versailles, Marly, and Trianon, whither the Ambassadour is to be conducted shortly, and where the Water-Works are to play for his Diversion. The Presents which the Grand Signior has sent by this Ambassadour to the King, are as follows: Two Horses of the Isle of Metelin, one of them having magnificent Furniture; a Mantle of Ermine, 10 Pieces of very rich Gold Stuff, eight Pieces of Mullin, six Pots of Balsam of Mecca, a Bow, and a Quiver with 60 Arrows. On the 22d Instant the King went to Vincennes to review the Troops which came lately hither to appear at the Entry of the Turkish Ambassadour, and the next Day his Majesty took the Air in the Elysian Fields.
