Madr'd, March 24.

**O**N the 15th Instant the King with all the Royal Family went to the Buen-Retiro. On the 9th of this Month arrived an Express from Rome, dispatched by Cardinal Acquaviva the 20th of February, with Advice of the Pope's having granted anew to his Catholick Majesty Leave to raise a Million and half of Ducats on the Clergy in the West-Indies, to be employed in the War against the Infidels. On the 16th the Marquess de Grimaldo, Secretary of State, visited Collonel Stanhope, and in the King's Name made him Compliments of Condolence on the Death of Earl Stanhope. 'Tis advised from Ceuta, that the Moors having made some Progress on their new Line of Contravallation, had placed two Brass Cannon and three of Iron to defend their Work. On the 22d Instant the Marquess de Ledes arrived at Court, and had a long Audience of the King.

**Dantzick, March 15, O. S.** The Czar came lately to Riga, and having ordered Provisions to be brought thither from Livonia and Courland for subsisting his Court five Months, it is supposed he designs to pass Part of the Summer there: His Chancery, and most of the Persons of Distinction of his Court, are attending him at Riga; whither likewise the foreign Ministers are come from Petersbourg. The Duke of Holstein passed through this City some Days ago, on his Way from Breslau to Riga.

**Paris, April 5.** The Council of Regency which was appointed to be held on the 3d Instant, upon the Subject of the India Company's late Petition, is put off to the 7th. The Cardinal de Bissy is set out for Rome, but the Cardinals de Mailly and de Polignac are still here, the former being detained by an indisposition, and the latter by want of Money to satisfy the great Debts he contracted formerly at Rome. Two noble Venerians are expected here with the Character of Ambassadors of the Republick, to give Satisfaction to the King for what was formerly done by the State against the Family of Ottoboni. On the other Side, this Court has appointed the Count de Gergy, who has resided for several Years past at Ratisbon, in the Quality of Envoy, to go Ambassador to Venice, as soon as those from the Republick are arrived here. It is advised from Rome that Mr. Law is arrived there, as is likewise the Cardinal de Rohan. M. de Longepierre, Secretary of the Duke of Chartres, and Member of the French Academy, died here the 31st past. The Government of St. Venant, vacant by the Death of the Marquess de Selve, is given to the Marquess de Ruffee, Lieutenant General and Sub-Governour to the King.

**Whitehall, March 31.** On the 26th Instant His Majesty was pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood on William Savage, Esq; His Majesty's late Solicitor General of the Island of Barbadoes.
