*Stockholm, March 29, O. S.*

**C**OUNT Lillisted and Baron Strumfield were still at Grislehaven on the 24th Instant; the Passage to Ahland was then full of Ice, and the Roads by Land impracticable. Last Week the Smaland Regiment of Infantry, consisting of 1200 Men, arrived here from that Province; and several other Regiments, both of Horse and Foot, are also on the March hither; so that it is computed there will be a Body of at least 12000 Men in the Neighbourhood of this City by the End of next Month. The King of Sweden came back on the 25th at Night, his Majesty not having been able to pass the River at Elcarbue in his Way to Upsal.

*Lisbon, April 10, N. S.* We have Advices here from Seville of the 25th and from Cadiz of the 30th of the last Month, which confirm the Arrival of the whole Spanish Army from Ceuta, except 5000 Men which are left for the Garrison of that Place; they add, that a Spanish Frigate of 24 Guns employed in the transporting of those Troops, was lost upon the Rocks of Tarriffa. The Spaniards own that they lost above 6000 Men in their Expedition to Barbary, and among the Troops that are returned such a Sickness rages, that all their Hospitals are crowded. On the 6th Instant the Fleet for the Rio de Janeyro sailed from this

Port, being 18 Merchant Ships under the Convoy of two Men of War. The same Day sailed the Dover, with Comadore Stewart on board for Gibraltar; and also the Newcastle Captain Falkingham, with Supplies for His Britannick Majesty's Forces in Minorca. The St. Albans from the Streights, and the Winchelsea from Gibraltar, are now in this Port.

*Admiralty-Office, April 17.* Sir John Norris, with the Squadron of His Majesty's Ships under his Command, sailed from the Nore on the 13th Instant, for the Baltick.

*Whitehall, April 18.* On Saturday the 15th Instant, a little after Seven a Clock in the Evening, her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales was happily delivered of a Prince at Leicester-House, there being then present in the Room his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, the Dutchesse of Dorset and Shrewsbury, the Countesses of Pembroke, Grantham, Cowper, and Bristol, Ladies of her Royal Highness's Bed Chamber, the Countess of Picbourg, the Women of her Royal Highness's Bed Chamber, Sir David Hamilton, and Mrs. Crane the Midwife who laid her Royal Highness. Their Royal Highnesses dispatched the Lord Herbert to acquaint His Majesty with it, and to make their Compliments, and His Majesty was pleased to send immediately Collonel Negus Commissioner for executing the Office of Master of the Horse, with his Compliments

ments to their Royal Highnesses. Her Royal Highness's safe Delivery being soon made publick by the firing of the Cannon in St. James's Park, an universal Joy was seen that Evening among all sorts of People throughout London and Westminster, of which the usual Demonstrations were shewed by Ringing of Bells, Illuminations, and Bonfires.

Yesterday His Majesty was pleased to make a Visit to Her Royal Highness on this happy Occasion, and to see the young Prince.
