St. James's, May 12.

AN Humble Address of the Mayor, Sheriff, Citizens, and Commonalty of the City of Norwich in Common Council assembled, has been presented to His Majesty by Waller Bacon and Robert Britcliffe, Esqs; the Representatives in Parliament of that City, introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Townshend, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Stockholm, April 19. On the 13th Instant in the Morning an Express arrived from Gislehaven, with an Account that the Plenipotentiaries of this Crown for the Conferences to be held at Neustadt, put again to Sea on the 11th in the Evening; and as the Wind continued some time fair, it is reckoned they got over to Abland the next Day. On the 13th the King reviewed the four Regiments of Infantry which were then come to this Place; and the same Evening most of the Field-Marschals, Generals, and principal Officers of the Army that are now here, had the Honour to sup with his Majesty at a House near the Park where those Regiments were mustered. The next Day the Provincial Regiment of the East Goths arrived also at this Place. It is said, that the whole Number of Troops which are already here or on the March hither, amount to twenty eight Battalions, and above 5000 Horse. The 17th Instant being the King of Sweden's Birthday, when his Majesty entred into his 47th Year, he was complimented in the Morning by a great Number of Persons of Distinction on that Occasion; and in the Evening there was a very splendid Appearance and Ball at the Palace: On the same Occasion, and by the Queen's Direction, there was Yesterday a French Comedy acted by the young Gentlemen and Ladies of the Court. The Senators, foreign Ministers, and most Persons of Note in Town were invited to see it; and the greatest Part of the Company were also afterwards invited to a second Ball at Court, which lasted till this Morning.

From on board the Sandwich at Copenhagen, April 29, O. S. The Fleet of His Majesty's Ships commanded by Admiral Norris, arrived here Yesterday in the Evening: In the Passage we had bad Weather, which separated three of our Ships from the rest, but they are now come in hither. As the Admiral passed Gottenbourg, he sent an Express to the King of Sweden, to acquaint his Majesty with his being come upon the Coast; and as he passed Elfenour he received a Letter from his Swedish Majesty dated the 15th Instant. The Admiral designs to make Use of the first Opportunity of Wind, to proceed to the Island of Hano near Carlscroon, to join the Swedish Fleet. P. S. The Wind being just now at Eight a-Clock in the Evening come fair, we are getting ready to sail to Morrow Morning early.

Turin, May 14. Yesterday the King of Sardinia went to the Veneria, in order to pass the Summer there. The Marquess of Villaclara, late Deputy from the Island of Sardinia, and now Governour in chief of that Kingdom, set out some Days ago on his Return thither. This is the King of Sardinia's Birthday, which his Majesty passes in Retirement in the Chartreux, it being his Custom to avoid receiving Compliments on that Occasion.

Paris, May 21. An Express arrived here on the 15th Instant in the Evening with the News, that on the 8th Instant Cardinal Conti, a Roman, was chosen Pope, and had taken the Name of Innocent the 13th: He was made a Cardinal in 1707, and is 63 Years old. Lettres de Cachet are sent to several Doctors of the Sorbonne, who have lately renewed their Appeal from the Pope's Constitution, to retire to divers Places in France; and Dom Thierry, a Benedictine, is banished the Kingdom. Mr. William Laws was carried from the Basile to Versailles on the 16th, to be present at the taking off the Seals from his Effects seized there, and making an Inventory of them: The same Day he was removed to Fort l'Evêque. The Earl of Portmore arrived here Yesterday from Spain, on his Way to England.

Whereas Information hath this Day been given to His Majesty in Council, that Mr. Levermore, Supervisor of the Riding Officers at Lydd, together with some other Officers under his Inspection, did on the 17th of March last, apprehend one Jacob Walter a notorious Owlter and Smugler, who some time since broke out of the Fleet Prison, to which Place he had been committed by Mesne Process for transporting of Wooll to France, together with one Thomas Bigg, who is also a noted Smugler; and that with the Assistance of a Constable they secured the said Walter and Bigg at the George Inn in Lydd till the 19th, when the Officers were in a riotous Manner assaulted by several armed Men, who fired upon them, and by Violence rescued the said Walter and Bigg: These are therefore to give Notice, that whoever shall discover the said Jacob Walter, aged about 40 Years, a tall Man, longish Face, ruddy Complexion, stout, well made, wearing a light Wig, and Thomas Bigg about the same Age, a short little Man, round visage, wearing a black Wig, or any of the following Persons, who were concerned in the rescuing the said Walter and Bigg, viz. Francis Norwood, Gib Jarvis, alias Tomkin, who is said to be shot through the Arm in rescuing the said Walter and Bigg, Edward Jarvis, alias Tomkin, Edward Gibbon, Thomas Srooker, Alexander Green, John Humphreys, or any other Person concerned in the said Rescue, or any of them, so as they may be apprehended and convicted, shall receive the Reward of 40 l. for each of them, to be paid upon such Conviction by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury; and in case any of the Offenders therein shall make such Discovery (other than the said Walter) that he, or they, will have His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
