Venice, May 30.

ON the 24th Instant a Council came to a Resolution to admit the Brother and Nephews of the present Pope into the Number and Rank of the Nobles of this State; and the next Day the Senate unanimously confirmed this Resolution: Advice of which was dispatched to Sig. Cornaro, Ambassadour of this Republick at the Court of Rome. On the 24th the Princess of Modena set out for Modena; the Prince conducted her as far as Fusina, and returned to this City: His Highness has this Day received an Express from Modena, but the Time of his Departure thither is not yet declared.

Berne, June 4. The Great Council of the Canton of Zurich having taken into Consideration a Letter newly written to them from the chief Magistrates of the Circle of Swabia assembled at Ulm, have resolved to communicate that Letter to all the Swiss Cantons, and to recommend to them to comply with the Circle's Request of interdicting all Commerce with France, on Account of the Plague. The Council of Zurich have written to the Magistrates of the said Circle, to inform them of this their Resolution by way of Answer, and to assure them that the Canton of Zurich will not only employ all imaginable Precautions for its own Safety and that of its Neighbours, but will use its utmost Endeavours to dispose the other Cantons to comply

with their Request. The Canton of Zurich have sent this Letter to Ulm by a Secretary, who has Orders to go on to Inspruck, in Case those Magistrates should have left Ulm, to use all Arguments for preventing the Interruption of Commerce between Switzerland and the Circle of Swabia, which that Circle has threatened in case the Cantons do not comply with their Demand. But seeing that two Voices only were wanting in the Assembly of Ulm to make the Interdiction take Place immediately, and that it is to be feared the Cantons will not easily agree upon so difficult a Point, it is apprehended that the said Interruption of Commerce with the Empire will take Effect, to the great Prejudice of the Canton of Zurich in Particular.

Paris, June 11. The Duke de la Force having presented on the 26th past a Petition to the King, setting forth the Irregularity of the Parliament's Proceeding against him, and several Proofs for his own Justification, and intreating his Majesty to annul the Arrêts given hitherto by the said Company with relation to his Affair, which he desires may be brought before the Council; this Petition has since been printed and dispersed in the Town; but it is not yet known what Resolution the Court will take upon it, the Parliament continuing to insist that this Affair may be decided by them.
