Westminster, July 29.

HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in his Royal Robes seated on the Throne, with the usual Solemnity, Sir William Sanderfon, Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act for raising a Sum not exceeding five hundred thousand Pounds, by charging Annuities at the Rate of five Pounds per Cent. per Annum upon the Civil List Revenues till redeemed by the Crown, and for enabling His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors (by causing such a Deduction to be made as therein is mentioned) to make good to the Civil List the Payments which shall have been made upon the said Annuities; and for borrowing Money upon certain Lottery Tickets, and for discharging the Corporations for Assurances of Part of the Money which they were obliged to pay to His Majesty, and for making good a Deficiency to the East-India Company.

An Act for raising Money upon the Estates of the late Sub-Governour, Deputy-Governour, Directors, Cashier, Deputy-Cashier, and Accountants of the South-Sea Company, and of John Aislabie, Esq; and likewise of James Craggs, Sen. Esq; deceased, towards making good the great Loss and Damage sustained by the said Company, and for disabling such of the said Persons as are living, to hold any Office or Place of Trust under the Crown, or to sit or vote in Parliament for the future, and for other Purposes in the said Act expressed.

An Act for appointing Commissioners to examine, state and determine the Debts due to the Army.

An Act for explaining and making more effectual the several Acts concerning Bankrupts.

An Act to explain and amend the Act of the twelfth Year of Her late Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for repairing the Highway or Road from the Stones-End in the Parish of St. Leonard Shoreditch, in the County of Middlesex, to the further-most Part of the Northern-Road, in the Parish of Enfield in the same County, next to the Parish of Cheshunt in the County of Hertford.

An Act for the King's most gracious general and free Pardon.

And to six private Bills.

And then the Lord Chancellour, by His Majesty's Command, said,

My Lords and Gentlemen,

Madrid, July 21. By a Courier from Barcelona we have had an Account of the Arrival there of a Packet-boat from Genoa, with Letters of the 2d Instant; being the first Vessel that is come since the settling of a Correspondence with Italy by that Passage; that Republick having allowed an Officer of the Posts appointed by his Catholick Majesty to reside in their City for the Management of the Conveyance of Letters by those Packet-Boats. By the same Courier we had Advice of the Arrival at Barcelona of the three Men of War commanded by Sig. Serrano, which carried the Cardinals Borgia and Belluga to Civita-Vecchia, and relieved the Garrison of Porto-Longone. The Marquess de Ledes, who went lately to the Escorial, has been declared Captain-General of the Coasts of Andalusia, Don Juan Manrique resigning that Employment. The Marquess de Jos Balbaes, who has for some time laboured under great Indisposition, is well recovered. The King has conferred the Honour of Grandee of Spain, of the first Rank, on the Duke

of San Miguel, a Sicilian, in Consideration of his good Services while the Spanish Troops were on the Island of Sicily in 1718.

Turin, July 23. On the 21st at Night Madame Royale, Mother of the King of Sardinia, was taken so ill, that a Courier was sent to give Notice of it to his Majesty and the Queen who were at Rivoli. The King, though he received this Advice after Midnight, immediately hastened to Town; but finding her Royal Highness somewhat better, returned in the Evening to Rivoli. His Majesty came hither again early this Morning, and intends to remain here, Madame Royale's great Age and the Continuance of her Indisposition, though it is not violent, giving Ground for Apprehension. She is so great a Benefactress to many Persons of Quality, such an Encourager of Manufacturies, and so extremely charitable to the Poor, that her Death would prove an universal Loss.

Stockholm, July 10, O. S. Sir John Norris arrived here on the 31st of last Month; having left the Fleets in their former Station at Cappel-Share. The same Day arrived a Courier dispatched from Neustadt by Count Lilienstedt, which Courier was sent back Yesterday. The King of Sweden has had no Return of his Ague, and continues in perfect Health. Letters of Notification in Form of the Death of the Landgrave of Hesse-Philipsdahl his Swedish Majesty's Uncle, being arrived on the 2d Instant, this Court is gone into Mourning for three Months on that Occasion.

Copenhagen, July 27. On the 24th Instant the King of Denmark, with the Queen and the young Princess, set out from Fredericksberg for Sleswig. His Majesty dined that Day at Ringstedt, eight Danish Miles from this Town, where he reviewed a Regiment of Horse. All the Troops that are quartered in Fuhnen and Jutland are ordered to be in Readiness, his Majesty intending to take a Review of them. The King of Denmark's Ministers are to follow his Majesty in 10 Days Time, together with the Chancery. General Schultz has the Care of this Town and Garrison during the King's Absence.

Paris, Aug. 3. The King, having been bled and having taken a Vomit by way of Precaution against the Small Pox, which the Physicians apprehended, is perfectly well to Day. The Turkish Ambassadour, who was to have set out Yesterday on his way home, put off his Journey till to Day.

Paris, Aug. 6. The King being intirely recovered from his late Indisposition, was complimented Yesterday by the Princes and Princesses of the Blood, the foreign Ministers, the Deputies of the Parliament, and a great Number of Persons of Distinction. During his Majesty's Illness the Cardinal de Noailles had caused Prayers of 40 Hours to be made in all the Churches of his Diocess, and the Parliament had ordered the Shrine of St. Genevieve to be opened on that Occasion. Since his Majesty's Recovery Te Deum has been sung in most of the Churches of this City; and there has been for these two Nights past Bonfires, Fireworks, Illuminations, and all Sorts of publick Rejoicings throughout the City.
