Turin, July 23. On the 21st at Night Madame Royale, Mother of the King of Sardinia, was ta-ken fo ill, that a Courier was fent to give Notice of it to his Majesty and the Queen who were at Rivoli. Paris, Aug. 6. The King being intirely recovered from his late Indifpolition, was complimented Yesterday by the Princes and Princesses of the Blood, the foreign Ministers, the Deputies of the Parliament, and a great Number of Perfons of Diffinction. During his Majefty's Illnefs the Car-dinal de Noailles had caufed Prayers of 40 Hours to be made in all the Churches of his Diocefs, and the Parliament had ordered the Shrine of St. Genevieve to be opened on that Occasion. Since his Majesty's Recovery Te Deum has been fung in most of the Churches of this City; and there has been for these two Nights past Bonefires, Fire-works, Illuminations, and all Sorts of publick Rejoicings throughout the City.
