Brussels, August 7, N. S.

Yesterday M. Heems, Secretary of the Council of State, communicated by Order of the Marquês de Prié to M. Pestfers the Dutch Resident here, a Letter written by the Magistrates of Francfort to the said Marquês, representing that Quantities of French Goods were sent up from these Provinces into Germany, which might bring the Contagion among them, and therefore desiring due Care might be taken. The said Secretary further acquainted M. Pestfers, that the Marquês de Prié had thereupon given Orders, that all Goods sent into Germany from these Parts for the future, shall be viewed and marked by the Custom-House Officers, and accompanied with a Certificate importing that the Bales contain only Manufactures of this Country, or such others as are not suspected of Contagion; and that his Excellency hoped the States General would give the like Direction with respect to the Goods sent from Holland to these Provinces.

Berlin, Aug. 9, N. S. The King of Prussia set out from hence on the 6th Instant for Stettin, where his Majesty is to receive the Homage of that Part of Pomerania which was given up to him by the late Peace with Sweden. His Majesty will also take a Review of three

Regiments which are in Quarters there; and he is expected back here by the 18th. M. Westphale, the late Danish Envoy at Petersbourg, returned hither two Days ago from Dresden, whither he was sent to notify the Queen of Denmark's Coronation. Letters from Preitsch of the 4th Instant relate, that the Marriage of the Prince Royal of Denmark with the Princess of Culmbach was solemnized on the 31st past.

Paris, Aug. 13. The Rejoycings on Account of the King's Recovery from his late Indisposition continue still, and we have had within these 8 or 10 Nights past Fire-works and Illuminations in several Quarters of the Town. The Dutchess of Orleans gave upon that Occasion on the 10th Instant a magnificent Entertainment at Bagnolette to the Duke Regent, the Duke of Chartres and to a great Number of Persons of Distinction, and in the Evening there were Fire-works and Illuminations; her Royal Highness caused also all the Inhabitants of that Village to be treated at Supper. The King gathers Strength every Day since his Recovery from his Sickness, and will go abroad this Afternoon to visit several Churches. On the 11th the Duke du Maine reviewed the Swiss Guards at Montroigne, and Refreshments and Wine were distributed both amongst the Officers and Soldiers to drink the King's Health: At Night M. Surbec, Captain of the first Company of

of those Guards, entertained that Duke at Supper, together with the Dutchess of Maine, the Prince of Dombes, and the Count D'Eu, who were come to see that Review. On the 8th Instant M. Gibert, an Agent of the Exchange, was taken up and carried to the Chatelet, for having paid the Day before a Bill of Exchange of 400 Louis d'Ors in Specie of a counterfeited Stamp, and his House being searched at the same time there were found 1700 more of the same Specie, which he declared to have received lately from Lisle in Flanders. Yesterday the Duke Regent gave Audience to the foreign Ministers at the Louvre, where his Royal Highness had lain the Night before in the Apartment that was fitted up for him last Year, and 'tis said he will continue there during his Regency. Sig. Maffey, who has resided some time at this Court, in the Quality of Nuncio Extraordinary from the Pope, received by the last Courier from Rome the Pope's Brief for taking upon him the Functions of Nuncio in Ordinary, in which Character he is preparing to make his Entry.

Hague, Aug. 15, N. S. The States General have sent to Brussels M. Bassacour, a Lawyer, who is Pensionary or Solicitor to our West-India Company, to treat with the Marquess de Prié for accommodating the Differences between that Company and the Ostenders. The States of Holland have been assembled four Days, during which they have had great Debates upon the Project of alienating by publick Sale the Domaines of this Province; which it is not doubted will be finally resolved on To-Morrow, notwithstanding the Endeavours of the Officers of the Chamber of Accompts to obstruct the Design.
