Westminster, August 10.

HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in his Royal Robes seated on the Throne, with the usual Solemnity, Sir William Sanderfon, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons. commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act for making several Provisions to restore the Publick Credit, which suffers by the Frauds and Mismanagements of the late Directors of the South-Sea Company and others.

And to one private Bill.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech to both Houses.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I Am glad that the Business of this and the former Session is at length brought to such a Period, that I have now an Opportunity of giving you some Relief, after the great Pains you have taken in the Service of the Publick.

The common Calamity, occasioned by the wicked Execution of the South-Sea Scheme, was become so very great before your Meeting, that the providing proper Remedies for it was very difficult: But it is a great Comfort to me to observe that Publick Credit now begins to recover; which gives me the greatest Hopes that it will be entirely restored, when all the Provisions you have made for that End shall duly be put in Execution.

I have great Compassion for the Sufferings of the Innocent, and a just Indignation against the Guilty, and have readily given my Assent to such Bills as you have presented to me, for punishing the Authors of our late Misfortunes, and for obtaining the Restitution and Satisfaction due to those who have been injured by them, in such Manner as you judged proper. I was at the same time willing and desirous, by my free and general Pardon, to give Ease and Quiet to the rest of my Subjects, many of whom may, in such a general Infatuation, have been unwarily drawn in so transgress the Laws.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I return you my hearty Thanks for the Supplies you have granted for the current Service of this Year, and particularly for your enabling me to discharge the Debts and Arrears on the Civil List; and to make good the Engagements I was under for procuring Peace in the North, which, in all Probability, will now very soon be concluded. These Instances of your faithful Endeavours to support the Honour and Dignity of the Crown at Home and Abroad, are fresh Marks of your Zeal and Affection to my Person and Government.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I take this Opportunity of acquainting you, that we have renewed all our Treaties of Commerce with Spain,

upon the same Foot as they were settled before the late War, which must necessarily prove an immediate and valuable Advantage to the Trade and Manufactures of this Kingdom.

I earnestly recommend to you all, in your several Stations, to suppress Prophaneness and Immorality, and to preserve the Peace and Quiet of the Kingdom.

You are all sensible, that the Dissentions occasioned by the great Losses that many of my Subjects have sustained, have been industriously raised and inflamed by malicious and seditious Libels; but I make no doubt but that by your prudent Conduct in your several Countries, all the Enemies of my Government, who flattered themselves they should be able to take Advantage from our Misfortunes, and blow up the Sufferings of my People into popular Dissent and Disaffection, will be disappointed in their wicked Designs and Expectations.

And then the Lord Chancellor, by His Majesty's Command, said,

My Lords and Gentlemen,

HIS Majesty's Royal Will and Pleasure is, that this Parliament be prorogued to Thursday the Nineteenth Day of October next, to be then here held; and this Parliament is accordingly Prorogued to Thursday the Nineteenth Day of October next.

Berne, Aug 8. Stockholm, July 19. M. Berkenteyn the Danish Minister arrived here on the 16th in the Evening, but has not yet appeared at Court. Yesterday being the King of Sweden's Name-Day the Court laid aside Mourning, and there was a splendid Appearance of Persons of Quality at Carlberg, and at Night there was a Ball. The Fleets continue still in their former Station at Cappel-Share. Last Week Lieutenant General Trautsferfer set out from hence for Stralsund, of which he is Governour.

Paris, Aug. 16 The Rejoicings here for the King's Recovery still continue; all the Trading Companies make Illuminations by Turns; the Jesuites have upon this Occasion distinguished themselves by most magnificent Illuminations and Fire-works, which were made at their Church two Nights ago.

Whitehall, Aug. 11. His Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable Hugh Lord Clinton Lord Lieutenant and Custos-Rotulorum of the County of Devon, and of the City and County of Exeter, (upon the Right Honourable the Lord Carteret's resigning those Offices) his Lordship this Day in Council took the Oaths appointed to be taken instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

The Right Honourable John Lord Viscount Grandison, is created an Earl of Ireland, by the Name, Style, and Title of Earl Grandison.
