A PROCLAMATION,

Requiring all Persons coming from any Port or Place on the Coast of France, Northward of the Bay of Biscay, to bring Bills or Certificates of Health.

WHereas we have received Information, that several Places in the Southern Parts of France continue to be infected with the Plague; and that the Infection has of late extended it self further within that Kingdom: We out of our great Care for the Preservation of our People, and to prevent the bringing the Infection into our Dominions, by our Order made in Council this second Day of October, have directed and required, that all Masters and other Persons having Charge of any Packet Boat, or other Ship or Vessel, coming from any Port or Place on the Coast of France Northward of the Bay of Biscay, (the same by our former Orders in Council not being put under Quarantine) and which shall arrive in any Port or Place within Great Britain, or any of the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, after the fourteenth Day of this Instant October, shall bring with them Bills or Certificates of Health, signed by the Chief Magistrate of the Port or Place from whence they shall respectively come, and produce the same, upon Demand, to the Principal Officer of the Customs, or other Officer appointed to see Quarantine duly performed, within the Port or Place at which they shall arrive; who are hereby respectively authorized and required to make such Demand, before any Person be permitted to land, or any Goods to be put on Shore out of such Packet Boat, Ship or Vessel; and that no Master or other Person, having Charge of any Packet Boat, or other Ship or

Vessel whatsoever, coming from any such Port or Place on the Coasts of France, as aforesaid, shall take on board, or bring into any Port or Place within Great Britain, or any of the said Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, any Person or Persons of what Condition or Quality soever they be, unless such Person or Persons shall respectively deliver to such Master or other Person, having Charge of such Packet Boat, Ship or Vessel, as aforesaid, Bills or Certificates of Health, signed by the Chief Magistrate of the Town or Place in France, from whence they shall come; and such Master or other Person, having Charge of any such Packet Boat, Ship or Vessel, shall produce upon Demand, such Bills or Certificates of Health, for all Passengers on board the said Packet Boat, Ship or Vessel respectively, to the Principal Officer of the Customs, or other Officer appointed to see Quarantine duly performed, within the Port or Place at which he shall arrive; who are hereby respectively authorized and required to make such Demand before any Person be permitted to land, or any Goods to be put on Shore out of such Packet Boat, Ship or Vessel; and in case such Master or other Person, having Charge of any such Packet Boat, Ship or Vessel, shall be guilty of any Default in the Premises, then from and after such Default made, such Packet Boat, Ship or Vessel, and all Persons, Goods and Merchandizes coming and imported in the same, and all Persons, Ships and Vessels, who, or which shall receive any Persons, Goods, or Merchandizes, from on board any such Packet Boat, Ship or Vessel, or shall go on board the same, and such Persons, as after Quarantine performed, shall be employed in the Hold of any such Packet Boat, Ship or Vessel, for the taking any Goods not liable to retain Infection from Hemp, Flax, or other Goods enumerated in our Order in Council of the fifth of February last, and our Proclamation of the same Date,

Date, notifying our said Order, shall be respectively subject and liable to all and every the Directions, Regulations, Appointments, and Restrictions, contained and mentioned in our said Order in Council of the fifth of February last, and Proclamation notifying the same; and all and every the said Directions, Regulations, Appointments, and Restrictions, shall, from and after such Default made, have Effect, and be put in Execution, for and in respect of all such Packet Boats, Ships and Vessels, and Persons, Goods and Merchandizes, as aforesaid, and all Matters and Things relating thereunto respectively, in as full and ample Manner, to all Intents and Purposes, as if the same had been originally inserted and described in our said Order in Council of the fifth of February last, and Proclamation notifying our said Order: Now to the Intent that no Person may pretend Ignorance of our Commands therein, we have thought fit, by and with the Advice of our Privy Council, to issue this our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby, in Pursuance of an Act of Parliament made in the seventh Year of our Reign, Intituled, An Act for repealing an Act made in the ninth Year of the Reign of Her late Majesty Queen Anne, Intituled, An Act to oblige Ships coming from Places infected, more effectually to perform their Quarantine; and for the better preventing the Plague being brought from foreign Parts into Great Britain or Ireland, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man; and to hinder the spreading of Infection, give Notice of the said Order of this second Day of October; and do require that all Persons do yield exact Obedience to the same. And we do hereby command the Commissioners of our Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of our High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, the Commissioners of our Customs, and the respective Governours and Commanders in Chief for the Time being, of the said Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, that they do take Care and give the necessary Directions, that the said Order be put in Execution, and duly observed. And we do likewise strictly charge and command the Commanders of our Ships of War, the Commanders of our Forts and Garrisons lying near our Sea-Coasts, and all our Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Chief Magistrates, Constables, Headboroughs, Tythingmen, and all other Officers and Ministers of Justice, to be aiding and assisting to the Officers of our Customs, and to all other Officers and Persons

that shall be concerned in putting our said Order in due Execution, upon Pain of incurring our highest Displeasure, and the Penalties provided by Law against such Offences.

Given at our Court at Kensington this second Day of October, in the eighth Year of our Reign.

Paris, Oct. 11. The Duke of St. Simon, who was to set out Yesterday for Spain, has deferred his Departure till next Week, his Equipage being not yet finished; 'tis said the Crown gives him 60000 Livres towards the Expences of his Embassy. Preparations are making for the Christening the Duke Regent's three youngest Daughters; the King is to be Godfather and the Dutchess Dowager of Orleans Godmother. M. de Bezons Archbishop of Rouen, died on the 8th Instant, at his Seat called Gallion in Normandy; 'tis thought the Bishop of Avranches, Brother to M. le Blanc, will succeed him. The Bishops of Bologne and of Langres are said to be very ill. On the 7th the Duke of Bourbon returned the Cardinal du Bois his Visit in the Hôtel d'Effiat, which the latter has hired, and where he will receive the Visits from all the Princes of the Blood. The Princess Ragozki arrived here on the 9th, and 'tis said the Prince her Husband will follow her hither shortly. The following Extract of the Advices relating to the Plague received by the Court to the 8th of October, has been communicated to the foreign Ministers.

Provence. From M. de Fossaud, Sept. 21. There has not been any sick at Arles these 28 Days past. The Quarantain was ending, and the Houses were perfuming. From M. le Bret, Sept. 20. All Provence being will nigh intirely free from the Plague, he proposes to moderate the Precautions which were used against Communication. Salon is recovering, and performing Quarantain. He (M. le Bret) had caused a Soldier to be Shot for concealing some suspected Apparel.

Comtat of Avignon. From M. de Morange's Governour of Orange, Sept. 25. The Plague has been brought to Orange by a Woman who came with Brandy from Bedarides: She and her three Children are dead, and her Husband has Tutors under

under his Arm-pits: Their House is fastened up, and the Street barricaded at both Ends. *M. de Nogaret writes the 25th of Sept.* That it was reported Cadrouffe, Carpentras, and Sorgues, in the District of Avignon, were infected. The Mortality was not violent at Avignon.

Languedoc. From the Marshal Berwick and the Duke de Roquelau e, the 26th and 28th of Sept. Between the 9th of August and the 18th of September 1200 had died in Marvejols: 300 remained sick there. The Distemper increased at Mende, and continues at Genouillac: It decreases in those Villages and Hamlets of the Gevaudan where the Inhabitants are in Barracks. It has ceased at the Abbey of Chambon. Since it broke out at Couzes and Vergogneux 76 Persons had died, and 19 remained sick. St. Genaix in Vivarais is infected. *From M. de Rothe.* Two Men are dead with Tumours on them, in a House of St. Jean de Gardonenque, a small Town four Leagues from Alais; thought to be occasioned by their eating bad Meat: Two Persons who were in their Company and eat with them, had Tumours likewise, but are cured.

By the last Letters from M. de Bonas, de Rambion, de Beaune, and de Liguerrac, the Velay, Auvergne, and Rouergue are in perfect Health; and such proper Precautions were taken at all the Passages, that it was hoped the Contagion would not penetrate into those Parts.

Stockholm, Sept. 22, O. S. On the 20th Instant Sir John Norris went from hence for Ellenab, in order to take the Opportunity of the first fair Wind to sail for England with the Fleet under his Command.

Copenhagen, Sept 27, O. S. at Noon. Just now we see from the Round Tower 21 Sail of large Ships, within two Danish Miles of this Town; which in all Probability is the Fleet under Sir John Norris's Command.

Gibraltar, Sept. 8, O. S. Captain Stewart having brought over hither all the British Captives from Tetuan, to the Number of 290, has caused them to be embarked in the Dover and Sheerness, which will sail for Great Britain with the first fair Wind.

Dublin, Sept. 29. Yesterday His Majesty's Answers to the Addresses of the two Houses of Parliament of this Kingdom at the Opening of the Session, were by Direction of his Grace the

His Majesty's Answer to the Address of the House of Lords.

His Majesty will omit nothing that may contribute to the Welfare and Happiness of a People that have so long distinguished themselves by their Zeal for the Protestant Religion, and the Good of their Country.

Notice is hereby given to all British Merchants trading to Leghorne, that the Magistrates of that Place expect proper Certificates, specifying the Quality and Quantity of the Goods laden in every Ship which shall put in there, with the Name of the Place where she was laden, and attesting that at the Time the Goods were put on board, such Place was free from the Plague. In Default of which Certificates, no Persons or Goods will be suffered to be landed from any Ship there, without first performing Quarantain.

Whitehall, Oct. 7.

An Arrêt of the French King's Council of State, dated the 1st of October, N. S. prescribes Rules to be generally observed at all the Ports of that Kingdom, with Respect to Ships, Persons and Goods coming thither from other Countries. Which Rules are as follows, and are published for the Information of all British Subjects whom it may concern.

CARTERET.

I.

His most Christian Majesty permits all foreign Ships and Vessels, belonging to Subjects of the Princes and States with whom his Majesty's Subjects have Liberty of Commerce, to enter with Goods not prohibited, the Ports and Rivers of
France,

France, provided they do not come from Countries infected or suspected of Infection, and that they did not touch at such Countries, nor had Communication in their Passage with suspected Ships; and provided also they bring due Certificates of Health from the Places whence they set out, and from all those where they touched.

II.

The said Certificates of Health, are to specify the Name and Burthen of the Vessel, the Name of the Captain or Master, the Number of the Sailors and Passengers, the Place from which the Vessel set out, and those she touched at, the Quality and Quantity of the Goods laden in her, and whether they are of the Growth or Manufacture of the Country where she was laden.

III.

The Goods which shall not be of the Growth or Manufacture of the Places where they were put on board, shall be accompanied with sufficient Certificates that they were not suspected of Contagion; which Certificates shall specify the Time when the said Goods were brought into the Port where they were laden, the Places from whence they were fetched, and whether after their Arrival they were opened and repacked.

IV.

The Certificates of Health, the Custom-House Permits, and the Bills of Lading, shall be signed by the Consul of the French Nation, if any such reside in the Place where the Ship was laden, with Copies of the said Papers.

V.

Such Consul shall deliver to the Master of the Vessel those Copies sealed up in a Packet directed to the Intendant or other proper Officer of the Port to which he is bound.

VI.

The Ships and Vessels, which having entered the Ports and Rivers of France, shall not fully satisfy all that is ordered by the preceding Articles, shall be confiscated, the Goods and Effects burnt, and the Persons who came in them be all shut up in an Hospital there to perform Quarantine.

VII.

All Captains, or Masters, Sailors and Passengers, on board the Vessels which shall enter the Ports, Harbours and Rivers of France, are forbidden to come ashore, or to land any Goods, without the express Permission of the Magistrates of

the Place or Officers of Health residing there, or to advance with their Vessels beyond the Place which shall be assigned them by the Shallops under the Direction of those Officers, on Pain of Death, and of the Goods and Effects being burnt.

VIII.

This Arrêt to take Place, with respect to all Ships departing from foreign Ports eight Days after the same shall be known there.

The following Regulations to be observed with regard to Passengers and Goods bound from the Ports of London and Dover for Calais, having been transmitted by the proper Officer of that Place to the Agent of the Packet Boats at Dover, and by him to His Majesty's Postmaster General; the same having been laid before His Majesty, are by His Majesty's Command made publick, for the necessary Information of all His Majesty's Subjects whom it may in any wise concern.

CARTERET.

Copy of the Regulations to be observed about the Contagion.

Article V.

The Captain of the Key shall give Notice to all the Packet-Boats and Transport-Ships which go and return from Dover and London to this Port, and to the Wherries, not to give Passage to any Person, of what Quality and Condition soever, not even to Couriers, unless they bring with them Bills of Health signed by the Officers of the Towns from whence they come; and in case the Masters of the Packet Boats, Transport-Ships or Wherries, do bring Persons who are not furnished with Certificates of Health, the Town-Guard shall not suffer the Persons or any Goods to be landed, but shall force them to return back upon the Penalties mentioned in the foregoing Article, which are, the Persons to be shot, and the Ships and Cargoes to be burnt; the Town-Boats shall also be forbidden to bring them on Shore, unless they shall first have produced their Bills of Health to the Town-Guard.

Article VI.

As the Herring-Fishing brings into this Port great Numbers of Fishing-Boats to fish there, the Master of the Key is to give Notice from Week to Week, that none of them may pretend Ignorance, that they are forbidden upon Pain of Death to give Passage to, or to take in at Sea, or on Shore, any Person, upon any Pretence whatsoever, or to go on board any Ships coming from suspected Places.
