Balcoae in the Plaza Major, which confilted of the feveral Companies of Tradefinen, the Jeluits, the Secular Priefts, and the Knights of St. Fago, who to the number of about 400, followed the Body in the habit of their order, these Knights were folin the Rear. The Saints Body was carried in a Sil-ver Shrine on a Triumphal Chariot, preceded by fuch Noblemen as are of the Family and Alliance of the faid Saint; in the Evening the Shrine was placed upon the great Altar in the above fid Church, where every day hath been fince celebrat ted with Sermons, Orations, Poems, and other exercises of the like nature, which is in all to be continued for 15 days, when the Body is to be returned to the Cafe profeffa.

On the 27 past arrived at Malaga Captain Wiltbire from Leghorne, and departed the next day with a Fleet of 20 Sayl of Merchant men for Engtand. Some days before came into that Port the Marquis of Bayona, with fix of the King of spains Galleys under his Command, and after two days ftay there, put to Sea again for *Cudiz*, having on board a confiderable quantity of Powder, for the use of the Armada preparing there for the Indies being afterwards to visit the Spanish Gartifons in Africa.

Historough, August 8. This day it feems had been-appointed a Duel near this place, between fome perions of quality, Subjects to the Duke of Holftein ; but the matter having taken wind, they were timely prevented. From Sweden we hear of 16 men of War that are equipping there, which it is faid, are onely intended as a Summer Guard.

From Poland by way of Berlin, we have advice, that that King was parted from War(ap on his way for Lublyn; that his Electoral Highnels of Brandenburgb, was bringing together 6000 Men in Pruffia, as was thought, to watch the motions of his Neighbours. We juddainly expect here the Princels of Danemark on her way to Oldenburgh.

Bruffels, August 16. His Excellency the Count de Monterey is at present at Iper, intending, as is faid, to be back here about the 20 initant, about which time the Baron d' Iffola, together with feveral Deputies from the States General will be likewile here from the Hague. We are told of a Cou-rier, who was fet upon by three perfons near Pcrone, as he was coming hither with Letters from Spain, which the faid perfons took away from him, leaving him very much wounded upon the place. Some daysfince marched from hence feveral Companies of Spanish Foot for Dendermond. We work dayly with all the diligence imaginable on the Fortifications of this place; this week was finished with a general Satisfaction the first Half Moon.

Dirro, August 19. At Ostend is arrived a teffel from St. Sebaftian, bringing thither the new General of the Cavalrie, who succeds Don Antonio de Cardoua in that command here.

We hear not as yet of the Count de Montereys being on his way hither, though he be fuddenly expected. Don Emanuel de Lyra is come from Flanders, and is preparing for his journey to the Надне.

His Excellency, it is faid, hath given orders for the building a Cittadel at Dixmuide. The Lower Town at Lyxemburgh, hath been lately demolified, for the better fecurity of the Higher Town.

This day turn speedily home to be laid up again. the Velt Marshal Wurts returned hither from Utrecht, and to morrow or nextday we expect here Prince Maurits from Cleve.

We are told of a Memorial lately given in to the States General by the Danish Refident here, concerning some matters depending between his Master and this State, and of an other given in by the French Secretary here, concerning the Arbitrage. The Heeren van Zevender, and uinder Hobge, de-nuted by the States of Holland to go and vilit Maestricht, for the putting every thing in a fit posture of defence, are on their way hither again, and dayly expected here in Town.

From Bylevelt we hear, that the Treaty which ought to have been concluded there, between the Dukes of Lunenburgh, and Bishop of Munster, is now wholly at a stand ; that the Respective Deputies being tired with the long delayes they have mer with in that affair, are ready to return to their feveral homes again.

According to our last advices from Calegne, the fears of those Magistrats of being attacked this Summer are very much lessend, though in the mean time they abate nothing of their former diligence, for the making all necessary provision for their security. Here are arrived lately several Tartars, who are, as is faid, going to Smeden, the-chief of whom has the Character of Envoy. Don Emanyel de Lyra is dayly expected here from Bruffels.

Worcefter, August 10. Yesterday the Right Re-verend Father in God, Walter, Lord Bishop of this. Diocefs, made his first entry into this City, whete-this City and County gave a new expression of their ancient Loyalty and Affection to His Majesty, and the Church. Several of the Clergy and Gentry met his Lordship at Purshon, Seven miles from this place, and attended him hither: When he came within a mile of the Jown, the Highways were thronged with a numerous croud of reople of all ranks; and fo were the Streets, all along to his Palace. One of the Streets was lined with a Company of Foot of this City, called The Glergy Band , who welcomed him. with a Volley of thot; the Bells in every Church Ringing for joy. His Lordship having alighted, and habited himself, went immediately to the. Cathedral, the Gentry and Clergy accompanying him, where the Dean and Prebendaries met him at the door, and waited upon him to his Seat; where being placed, Te Deum was fung, and after that, followed the Evening Prayer ; which ended, his Lordship returned to his Palace, accompanied by the Major, Aldermen, and Common Council; as alfo the Gentry and Clergy of the whole County; Hague; August 20) The States of Holland con-tinue ftill allembled, but avis faid, thay teparate in few days, not to meet again till the middle of great farisfaction, and full of acknowledgments to the mext Month, in the interim feveral affairs ton-tinue flill indebare before them, without any great i late of fuct fingular Piety and Worth.
