Madrid, November 3. N the 30th of last Month an Express from France arrived at the Escurial, with the Ratifications of the Treaties of Marriage concluded between the two Royal Families; and with an Account of the Duke of St. Simon's being on the Road from Paris for Spain. Hereupon the Court refolved to remove hither To-Morrow, and Orders were issued to hasten the Preparations for the Journey their Catholick Majesties have refolved to take with the Infanta, as far as Burgos. The Marquess de Mauleyrier having taken on him the Character of Ambailadour of France, and being appointed to act jointly with the Duke of St. Simon, who is vested with the same Character; · his Catholick Majesty has nominated the Marquesses de Bedmar and Grimaldo, to be his Plenipotentia. ries for adjusting with the said French Ministers the Ceremonies proper to be observed at the respective Delivery and Reception of the Infanta and of Mademoiselle de Montpensier. The said Marquess de Maulevrier, who some Time since had the Honour of Knighthood of the Golden Fleece conferred on him, has not yet been vested with the Badges of that Order; because the Pope's Nuncio has interposed, by a Memorial presented to his Majesty, setting forth, that the Marquess being before a Knight of the Order of St. Lewis, cannot receive and wear the Distinctions of the other Order, without an express Dispensation from the Pope. The Queen Dowager of Spain who resides at Bayonne, has sent Presents of Gold Watches adorned with Diamonds to the Marquess and Marchioness de Grimaldo, in Acknowledgment of that Minister's good Offices in procuring Payment of the Arrears of the Jointure fettled on her by King Charles II, with Leave also to return into any Province of this Kingdom, and take her Residence in whatever Town she shall chuse. A new Regulation is published, for preventing the bringing in of the Plague from France; by which Regulation the most rigorous Punishments are or-dered to be inflicted by the Governours of the Ports and of the Inland Frontier Places, upon all those who shall offend against the Rules prescribed therein.

The Duke de Roquelaure in his Letters of the 3d, 5th and 7th of November, says the Plague does not make any Progress towards the Vivarais, the Velay, or the Sevennes. The Blockade of Alais is well kept: From the 1st to the 3d of November Tr Persons died there: Two Pamilies only of that Town are infected; they were to be removed into the Suburbs. The Distemper seemed to have veryomuch abated at Marvejols the 3d. Good Care is taken of Mende, but the Sickness continues there. Alterrac is infected; two Families have already perished there; That Village has but so Houses. M. de Nogaret writes the 7th of November, That to the 3d of November there were 1539 dead at Avignon and 1480 fick. M. de Galean had writ to him two Days before, That the Distemper decreased there a little. M.
