A Stage Coach near the Turnpike on Hounslow-Heath, of a Diamond Ring, a Silver Seal, and some Money, about three Months ago.

A Man and a Woman in a Lane, single Hors'd, turning up by the Windmill, between Haawell-Green and Southall, of Eleven shillings, and a Whip, the Woman had a Ridinghood on.

An elderly Gentlewoman in a Chariot, of a Cane, a Guinea, and some Silver, on Hounslow-Heath, about two in an Afternoon.

Some Women in a Chaise near the Turnpike beyond Southall, about Eight a Clock at Night, on Acton Fair Day, going towards Uxbridge, robbed of some Silver, Silver Three-Pences, and Silver Pocket Pieces, one whereof was Queen Mary's, with her Head on one Side and a Rose on the other, a Silver Box marked M. S. with a Piece of Spunge in it.
