HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in his Royal Robes seated on the Throne, with the usual Solemnity, Sir William Sanderfon, Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act for granting an Aid to His Majesty by a Land Tax, to be raised in Great Britain, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred Twenty Two, And to three private Bills.

Paris, Dec. 12. The Extract of the Advices relating to the Plague received by the Court to the 3d Instant, from the Comtat of Avignon, and from Provence, and communicated to the foreign Ministers, is as follows.

The Comtat. M. de Nogaret, in his Letter of the 13th of November, writes to the Duke de Roque-laure, that the Plague had begun to be more violent at Avignon; that all the Ports on the Rhosne are well guarded; that one Duplessis a notorious Smuggler of prohibited Goods, who had escaped from Avignon, had been taken in Dauphiné and shot dead. It was reckoned, that from the 19th of September to the 15th of November 2000 Persons had died at Avignon. Some Persons had called out to M. de Vedrille from the other Side of the Rhosne, to tell him, that Cavaillon, the Isle of Perne, and the Tor, large Places in the Comtat, had within a few Days been infected. M. de Vedrille in his of the 20th of Nov. sends a Letter from Avignon of the 12th, by which it appears that the Sickness decreases there; on the 9th no more than 13 died, and 32 fell sick. It was computed that to the said 9th of November 1237 had died there. M. de Chabrilan in his of the 18th of November sends likewise a Letter from Avignon of the 9th, advising, that they flattered themselves the Mortality was decreasing there; the Tumours turned into malignant Fevers. That Sorgues was in a very bad Condition, the Plague having swept away almost all the Inhabitants. Caumont and Bedarides continue in a very bad State, Chasteauneuf is in a pretty good one. On the 14th there were at Orange nine sick, 16 recovering, and it was reckoned 55 had died there since the breaking out of the Distemper. Good Order was still maintained there.

Provence M. le Bret writes the 14th and 16 h of November, that Besse and Roquebruffanne continue in a bad Condition. M. de Jeaulleand writes the 11th of November, that there remained at Arles but 16 sick, whose Sores had turned into Fistulas. The Bailly de Langeron, in his of the 13th of November, confirms the good State of Health in Mar-seilles. Alauch which is two Leagues from thence, had the two preceding Days had 12 Persons taken sick; the Bailly had formed a Line on that Side, to hinder the Peasants of the Territory of Mar-seilles from communicating with those of that Village, and a Man who had broken the Orders given was shot dead.

Whitehall, Dec. 7. On Saturday the 2d of this Month, the Reverend Dr. Cannon was, by the President and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Lincoln, chosen Dean of the said Church, in Virtue of His Majesty's Letter given under the Signet November the 21st last past, and sent to them for that Purpose.

And that the Transfer Books of the said Company will be shut till the said Ballot is over.
