Hull, August 16.

Last week sailed from hence four vessels laden with the Commodities of these parts, bound for France.

Deale, August 20. A Pinke arrived yesterday from *Amsterdam*, says, that on her way hither, she passed through the *Dutch Fleet*; that they were about fifty sayl, and then lay to the Southward of *Dunkirk*.

Cambric, July 26. From *Barthey* write, that the Turks are lodged under *Szaragrod*, and had been with parties to near our Army, as to carry away several Prisoners from thence. That *Dorosensko* was certainly on his march towards that place, being assured, as is said, of great assistance from the Turks and Tartars; that *Hanenko* who hitherto had declared himself for the *Poles*, was now privately treating with *Dorosensko*, which it is feared, may be to the prejudice of this Crown.

By Letters from the great General *Sobietzki*, we have advice, that the great Cham of *Tartary*, was in person in the Field, marching towards these parts, to joyn as was feared with the Turks; that the Grand Signior had sent orders to all his Bassoas on these Frontiers, to be ready to assist the Cossacks, in any occasion they should stand in need of them, That he intended to come and lodge the 30 instant with the Army under this place.

Palermo, July 28. Our Vice-Roy the Prince de *Ligny*, is returned hither again from visiting several places in this Kingdom, being at present perfectly recovered of his late sickness. From *Trapani* we hear, that they had lately taken there a Turkish Brigantine, who it seems, ventured too near the Shore, and so was surpris'd by the Inhabitants, having 10 or 12 Turks, and one Renegado on board.

By a Greek Bark put in here, we are told, that the Captain Bassa was arriv'd at *Candia*, with his Fleet, consisting of 58 Gallies, besides other Vessels; that they heard not of any thing considerable they had done during their being abroad; and that it was thought, the said Captain Bassa, had no orders to attempt any thing this year, but to prepare against the next Spring, when the Grand Signiors Forces both by Sea and Land, are intended, as is said, to be very considerable.

By these advices, as well as those we receive to the same effect from other parts, we seem to be secured from all danger, for this Summer at least; inasmuch, that the Forces which are coming hither from *Naples*, for the greater security of this Kingdom, have had orders from our Vice-Roy not to proceed.

Genoa, July 29. On Thursday last arrived here 4 Gallies, and on them the Duke de *Ferandina*, who is going to *Spain* from *Naples*. This day came hither Monsieur *Clo*, to compleat the Leavies he hath permission of this Republick to make in these parts.

From *Milan* they write, that the Count de *Euenstide* General of the Cavalry, was arriv'd there, having been received by the Governor the Duke d' *Ossuna*, together with all the Nobility with great kindness. That the Nobility continue very much dis-

atisfied with their Governour, and are using great endeavors to have him recalled.

Rome, August 1. The difficulties which have been made by the Duke of *Savoy*, concerning the admission of Signior *Durazzo*, as the Popes Nuncio at his Court, are not yet accommodated, though the Bishop of *Laon* hath taken the matter upon him, promising the Government here, that he will conclude it to his Holiness satisfaction; in the interim, Signior *Durazzo* continues near *Bologna*, expecting orders from hence, whether he must proceed on his way to *Turin*, or return again hither. The Count de *Prado*, Ambassador here from the Prince Regent of *Portugal*, is preparing for his return home about the middle of the next Month, and in the interim, we are told, that Don *Abren* is to be here as Resident from that Crown, and that he is already on his way hither.

They are here at present seeking a certain yearly summe to be allowed the Ambassadors, and other Forreign Ministers residing in this Court, in lieu of the great Franchises and Immunities they formerly enjoyed.

From *Astoli* we have advice, of the great disturbances occasioned by the Bandits in those parts; that they have lately killed above 150 Soldiers belonging to that Garrison, besides many of the Inhabitants, whom they murdered in a most miserable manner.

Madrid, August 5. From *St. Lucar* they write, that our Fleet was parted thence under the Command of Don *Henrique Henriques de Gusman* for *New Spain*; from whence they likewise expected a Return Fleet, for which, we are not without some concern, whilst we are informed, not onely of several single men of War, but of a considerable Squadron that are plying upon our Coasts.

The new Leavies made for the *West-Indies*, under the Command of Don *Antonio de Cardona*, are well nigh compleated, and some part already embankt, and the Count de *Montesarchio* is to follow with 2000 more; on the Fleet that is at present sitting out at *Cadix* for those parts. Since the departure of the Heer *van Beverning*, late Ambassador here from the States General of the United Provinces, the Sieur *Wateonier*, Secretary of that Embassy, hath received Credentials from the States, in order to the taking upon him the care of their affairs here, in the absence of an Ambassador.

The 3 instant being the Feast of *St. Jago*, was performed the Bull-fight in the *Plaza Major*; on which occasion several of the young Nobility behaved themselves with great courage and dexterity, with the general applause of the Spectators.

Warsaw, August 7. Yesterday marched from hence most of the Fortes that are to attend his Majesty on his journey towards the *Ukrain*; his Majesty intending to have followed himself the next day, but Letters coming that evening with advice, that the Popes Nuncio was approached within very few miles of this place, his Majesty has been pleased to defer his going hence, till the beginning of the next week. to the end, the said Nuncio may have his first Audience of him here before

his departure; the Queen, we are told, will accompany the King as far as *Fanowitz*, and from thence return hitner again.

The *Moscovite* Ambassador hath now his dispatches, and is preparing for his return. The news we daily receive from the *Ukrain*, very much troubles us, though all possible care be in the mean time taken, for the preventing the dangers that threaten us from those Infidels; our Army will be divided into four Bodies, as well to prevent being blocked up, as to be ready at hand to relieve those places, which the Enemy seems to have their designs upon, though we cannot yet hear, of any attempt they have made upon any place.

Stockholm, August 9. On Tuesday last their Majesties returned hither out of the Country; the next day the Envoy from the Elector of *Saxony*, had Audience of his Majesty. Here is arrived out of *Livonia* Count *Tor*, Governor of that Province. It is reported, as if the *Muscovites* were desirous to treat with us, for the settling a more firm Peace between them and this Crown, and the rather, by reason of their being still very much pressed, with the disturbances from the Rebels, who notwithstanding the loss of their chief Leader *Stephan Radzin* (who, as is confidently affirmed was he, that suffered at *Masko*) continue very powerful and insolent.

Venice, August 14. Last week the French Ambassador was in the Senate, to desire leave, as is said, for the raising of 1200 *Heydukes* in *Dalmatia* for the service of his Master, which, we are told, they after some debate consented to, provided they exceeded not the above mentioned number; and to that end, have assigned, such as shall be to that purpose Commissionated by his most Christian Majesty, a small Island on the Coast of *Dalmatia*, where those Officers may set down such men as they procure in these parts, till they have finished their Leavy.

Cavallier Quirini appointed by this Senate to succeed *Baylo Molina*, as their Ambassador at the Port, hath been lately taken very ill of the Gout, inso much as to make him altogether incapable of undertaking that journey for the present; the two Gallies however are ready in Port to attend his recovery.

From *Zant* we hear, that *Monsieur d'Almetas* had been there with 14 French men of War under his Command, to cruise, as was said, upon those Seas in quest of Pyrates.

This Senate hath some days since sent orders to the Captain of *Verona*, to come hither in order to his appearance before them, within the term of 8 days, to give an account of some things committed by him, with which the Republick is much displeas'd. Here, are at present ready in Port 9 Ships bound for *Turky*, and on board them goes the Consuls that are design'd for *Soria*, and the other places in those parts.

The Senate having lately made a resolution, obliging several exempted Orders, and amongst them the *Jesuits* here, to attend the Duke in all Processions, as the Mendicants and the other inferior Orders do; the *Jesuits* seem much dissatisfied therewith, as pretending they are by the Popes special favor, freed from such attendances, and to that end, have some days since been in body in the Senate, to plead their priviledges, in order to be excused from the said attendance.

Marseilles, August 15. We have advice, of two Sally men of War more destroyed by our Frigats, the particulars we yet want. By a Bark arriv'd this morning from the *Levant*, we are told, that the Corsairs of *Tripoli*, have lately taken 13 sayl of

Merchant men of several nations, amongst which was a Dutch ship of very considerable force, the other being *Genoeses*, *Leghorneses*, and *Venetians*.

Hamburg, August 21. Here are at present several persons of great quality in this Town, and amongst others the Duke of *Meckelenburgh*, whose business it is thought, may be to raise Men. The Count *de Coningmark* is daily expected here, being to raise two Regiments of Horse in these parts, for the service of his most Christian Majesty.

From *Stockholm* they write, that *Monsieur Rompone* Ambassador from *France*, was not as yet arriv'd, but that in the interim, all necessary preparations are making for his Reception. That since their Majesties return out of the Country, the Senate had been assembled, and had dispatched several affairs of importance.

Our advices from *Warsaw* speak of the bad news they daily receive out of the *Ukrain*, the *Tartars* and *Cossacks* being on their march to joyn with the *Turks*; and that *Hanenko*, who had hitherto espoused the interest of the *Poles*, had made an accord with *Dorosenko*.

Brussels, August 21. This morning parted hence, *Don Emanuel de Lyra* for the *Hague*, where he is to reside in quality of Ambassador, in the room of *Don Estevan de Gamarra*, lately deceased.

Some days since arriv'd at *Ostend* from *Spain*, *Don Francisco Antonio Agartos*, whither he had been sent by his Excellency, concerning several things relating to this Government; and at the same time arriv'd likewise there, Four hundred Spanish Foot, which, as we are told, will be suddenly followed by others, it being the Queen of *Spain*'s intentions to have a standing Body of Twelve thousand Spanish Fantassins in these Countries.

Yesterday the said *Don Francisco Agartos* came hither, having been with his Excellency at *Tper*, whence his Excellency, we are told, had thoughts to part the Eighteenth instant, towards *Newport* and *Ostend*, so as to be in Fourteen days here at farthest.

Some days since pass'd this place, the *Sieur Mastiette*, Colonel of a Regiment of Horse in *Bourgogne* for *Ostend*, with intentions to expect his Excellencies arrival there, he being, as is said, sent by *Don Hieronimo de Quinones*, Governor of that Province, upon the occasion of the difference between his Excellency and him, concerning the independency of his Government.

Here is arriv'd the Count *de Steinbock*, together with some other of the Swedish Nobility to see these Countries.

Paris, August 22. Their Majesties continue still at *Fountainbleau*, not being expected at *St. Germain* till the beginning of the next Month. The King it is said, hath nominated Cardinal *Rospigiosi* to succeed Cardinal *Antonio Barberin*, in the place of great Almoner of *France*, and at the same time to bestow the Archbishopsrick of *Rheims*, voyd by the death of the said Cardinal, on *Monsieur de Tilliers* Son, who was during the Cardinals Life, Coadjutor of that See.

It is said, that the young Duke *de Thoyars*, is to be married to *Madamoiselle de Crequi*; and *Madamoiselle de Roquelzure* with *Monsieur de Flix*.
