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Paris, January 7.

THE Infanta of Spain having set out on the 14th past from Letma, it is believed the Exchange of the two Princesses will be made To-Day upon the Frontiers of France, in the Island where formerly the Conferences for the Pyrenean Treaty were held. The Duke d' Ossuna is taken up with receiving and returning the Visits of the Princes of the Blood and the Ministers here, and designs to leave Paris the latter End of this Month. It is now said he will be succeeded by the Duke de Bournohville whom the King of Spain has named to be his Ambassadour at this Court. The Reconciliation between the Prince and Princess of Conti is chiefly attributed to the good Offices of the Chancellor and the Marshal de Villars. That Prince went on the 5th Instant to his Country Seat de l'Isle d'Adam, where he will remain all this Week. The Sale of the Merchandizes brought by the three Ships belonging to the East India Company which arrived some Months ago is finished, and amounts to about eight Millions of Livres. Last Night a Fire broke out upon the Quay de Gevres, which consumed three Houses; but was extinguished very soon by a Detachment of French and Swiss Guards, who were sent thither for that Purpose. The following Extract of the Advice relating to the Plague received by the Court on the 31st of December, has been communicated to the foreign Ministers.

The Duke de Roquelaure in his Letters of the 12th and 14th of December writes, that St. Genaix and the scattered Houses of the Parish of Affions continue in the same Condition; all those Places are kept carefully blocked up, and 'tis hoped the Distem-

per will not spread further. At Genouillac, Coocoules, Bournans, la Salle du Gardon, St. Paul la Coste, and Salindres, none have died or fallen sick in several Days. The Distemper does not make any Progress in the Gevaudan, and since the Weather became cold, it appears to have decreased considerably in all the infected Places. M. de Rothes in his of the 15th, 17th, and 19th, says, the 12th, 13th and 14th of December 13 Persons died at Alais, two of them of Distempers, not contagious. The 8th and 9th six died at Mende, and three at la Salle du Gardon. All the other Places are in a very good Way. Since the 15th died at Alais seven Persons, three of them of common Distempers; and two at Mende the 11th and 12th. The Accounts from other Places continue favourable. Since the 17th nine Persons have died at Mende and seven at Alais. Now and then some drop still at Maryjols. A Man is dead at Salindres, a Woman at la Salle du Gardon, and a Girl at Genouillac, where no Person had died in several Days. The Bishop of Alais writes the 12th and 15th of December, that in the Infirmaries of the Suburbs of Alais there remained but 29 sick, of whom it was hoped one third would recover. A Priest and his Sister who were under Quarantain in the Town are dead. Two old Women are also dead, but without any Marks of the Plague; and two Children among those who are performing Quarantain. M. de Fraile who commands in Mende, writes the 9th of December, that 82 sick remained in the Infirmaries there, Part of whom it was hoped would be cured. The Distemper was decreasing; the last Wang of the Moon had not been so pernicious as the preceeding. 39 Persons who had recovered and whose Houses had been well perfumed, were re-admitted into the Town. M. Gamasy and Jehin, Physicians at Mende, write

write the 15th of December, that there were still 70 sick in the Infirmarys; the rainy Weather retarded their Cure, but they had great Hopes the Frost would favour them. M. de Vognie, in his of the 9th and 14th of December, confirms the good State of Health at several Places of the Gevaudan: At Laurac six Persons out of 11 had died in one House. M. d'Yvergny in his of the 16th gives the like Account: Two Persons were dead in the Village of Blatters in that Part of the Country with which Communication is forbidden. The Suspicion which had been entertained of Usez, seemed by the Event hitherto groundless. The Distemper has not yet passed the Tarn. The Marquess de Brancas writes the 15th of December, that for seven Days none had fallen ill at Alauch. Bessé and Roquebruffanne are much better; as is also the Comtat, where the Sickness abates every where. M. de Belrieu in his of the 19th of December, says the Line of Pierrelatte is duely kept; and that all Dauphiné is in a good State of Health. The Mortality which had lessened at Avignon from the 14th, had from the 17th made new Progress; the rest of the Comtat continues in a bad State: Some Farmhouses about Carpentras are infected. Aubignan is blocked up. At Orange two Persons fell sick on the 16th, after none had been taken ill in seven Days successively. M. de Verbrille in his of the 17th of December sends a Letter from Avignon of the 8th, importing that the Sickness had decreased a little there. The Marquess de Nogaret, in his of the 17th of December, sends another Letter from Avignon, of the 16th, giving an Account, that 30 or 40 fell sick still every Day there: 41 or 120 were in the Infirmarys, and to the 16th of December it was reckoned 4000 had died there. At Orange several were recovering. Carpentras and Perne are in Health, but the Territory about them infected. The other Places of the Comtat have been a little better for some Days past. Sarisans and Sorgues continue ill. The Territory of Védene is lately infected. The Marquess de Chabریان writes the 16th of December, that in general the Gevaudan, the Vivarez, and the Sevennes are in a good State of Health. Chambon is absolutely freed from the Distemper. He thinks the Plague is drawing to an End. M. de Pilles writes the 15th of December, that the four preceding Days none had died or fallen sick in Alauch and its Territory. The 12th, 19 Persons remained in the Hospital. M. de Brett in his of the 6th and 8th of December writes, that it was judged the Sickness

was decreasing at Alauch, Bessé, and Roquebruffanne: In an House at la Seine two Children had died.

St. James's, Jan. 2.
