

Dauphiné, writeth the 21st of December, that the 12th there were very few sick at Orange; where had died in all; the Neighbourhood included, 120 Persons. Towards the End of November there died at Avignon in seven Days above 1000 Persons, but the Distemper has a little decreased there. M. de Vedrille in his of the 19th of December, sends an Account of the dead at Avignon to the 10th of December; amounting to 3139 Persons; and a Letter which he had received from thence, advising, that on the 7th and 8th 80 died and 55 fell ill there. The Marquis de Chabillant in his of the 25th of December writes, that the Advices from Avignon of the 21st said, many of those who had been sick some Time died, but few had been newly taken ill, which was attributed to the cold Weather: This made it judged, that the Distemper was drawing to an End in that City. According to a Letter from Orange of the 14th, that Town had none sick, but several Farm-houses in its District were infected. Salindres, which was believed to be free, is suspected a-new, from the Death of an Inn-keeper after 24 Hours Illness. M. de Belrieu, Major-General, writes the 22d of December, that on the 6th 11 Persons were put under Quarantain at Frejus, and one House there was shut up where a Deserter had lain, because some of his Comrades had died of the Plague. That Deserter had got Lodging by producing a Bill of Health which the Consuls of Bagnols had given to his Father, who let his Son have it; a Detachment was sent to seize him. M. de Launay in his of the 24th of December, says Dauphiné is in perfect Health, and that the Line from the Durance to the Rhosne is duly kept. The Marquis de Brancas in his of the 22d and 24th of December writes, that for 16 Days only one Woman had fallen sick at Alauch. The Distemper decreased at Bessé and Roque. The Marquis de Caylus, in his of the 23d of November sends a general Account of all the Places of Provence which have had the Infection, and of the Number of the dead at each Place: Those Places are 52, and the Total of the dead in them is 87796. M. le Bret, Intendant of Provence, in his of the 22d of December writes, that Alauch and Bessé give Hopes of Recovery. Roquebruffanne was not so well. Avignon was said to be growing better. M. Pertin Major General in his of the 21st of December confirms, that the Distemper draws to an end in Provence; Bessé, Roquebruffanne and Alauch being the only Places infected, and the Sickness decreasing there daily. M. de Montlibert an Ingenier at Toulon, writes the 10th of December, that Gazeau, St. Estayer, Carnouilles, Gonfaron, Flaffan, Cabasse, Forcalqueret, and Pierrefeuca, are newly infected, and three or four other Places suspected: These Places are in the Neighbourhood of Toulon.
