THE last Letters from Petersbourg give an Account, that Count Kinski the Imperial Minister being recalled, had had his Audience of Leave of the Czar, and designed in a short time to set out for Vienna. His Czarish Majesty has lately issued an Edict with Relation to the Trade of Archangel, by which all Goods for Exportation, especially Hemp, formerly carried to that Place, are ordered to be brought to Petersbourg. On the 19th Instant arrived here the Duke and Duchess of Mecklenbourg, who proceeded the next Day for Petersbourg.

Berlin, Jan. 6. The King of Prussia returned to Town on the 2d Instant, being intirely recovered of a Hurt he received by a Boar as he was Hunting near Wusterhausen the 15th of the last Month. That Accident happened to him in the following Manner; Three Dogs having fastened upon the Boar, the King was alighting from his Horse, when the Dogs quitting their Hold, the Boar made at him while he had yet a Foot in the Stirrup, and with his Tusk struck a large Wound in the outer part of his Thigh: His Majesty was carried to Potsdam, and the Wound having no Fever attending it, was not difficult to cure. The Day his Majesty returned hither, the Lord Whitworth His Britannick Majesty's Ambassadour had Audience of him. The Duke of Mecklenbourg passed incognito this Week, about three German Miles from hence, for Dantzick on his Way to Petersbourg. His Prussian Majesty designs to go the 13th Instant to Wusterhausen, having ordered Preparations to be made for Hunting the Wild Boar several Days following in that Neighbourhood.

Turin, Jan. 7. Upon the Return of a Courier from Germany, his Sardinian Majesty accompanied by the Queen and the Prince, went on the 4th Instant to the Apartment of Madam Royale, where the King publickly declared the Conclusion of a Marriage between the Prince of Piedmont and a Princess Palatine of Sulzbach. This News was received with universal Joy; and the next Day there was a great Appearance at Court; all the Persons of Quality and Distinction making their Compliments of Congratulation to his Majesty and the Prince, whose Hands they had the Honour to kiss. Mr. Molesworth the British Envoy, had particular Audiences of all the Royal Family, to make the proper Compliments on this Occasion. The Count de Saluces, Captain of the King's Life Guard, is appointed to compliment and conduct the Princess hither: He is ordered to begin his Journey with all Expedition; but the Winter-Season and the short Days will, it is

thought, retard her Highness's Arrival here till towards the End of Lent.

Turin, Jan. 10. The Cardinal de Rohan who was expected here the last Week, is not yet arrived; having been taken so ill of the Gout at Modena, that he could not proceed on his Journey. The Count de Saluces is set out for Sultzbach, his Son and several other Gentlemen attending him; They are gone Post, and their Equipages are to follow. It is said some Promotions in the Army will be made very soon; but those which were expected in the Order of Knighthood of the Annonciada, will probably be referred to grace the Marriage.

Paris, Jan. 17. The Duke of Chartres having been bled the 6th time on the 15th Instant in the Morning, found himself pretty easy in the Afternoon, and rested very well that Night. His Fever has since very much abated, and he is now judged to be out of Danger. The Marshal de Villars got a Fall some Days ago, and by it his Leg in which he received a Wound in the late War, was swelled very much; but it is believed it will be without any bad Consequence. The King has named M. Pannier d'Orgeville Master of Requests, to be his Envoy Extraordinary to the Elector of Cologne. M. Anthony Coypel, first Painter to the King and to the Duke Regent, Director and Rector of the Royal Academy of Painting and Sculpture, famous for his many excellent Performances in his Art, died in this City the 7th Instant, in the 61st Year of his Age.
