THE Cardinal de Rohan arrived here on the 28th Instant from Rome, and has since kept his Chamber, being indisposed of the Gout. It is said the Court is very well satisfied with the Services he has done in Italy, and that he will have a great Share in the Disposition of the vacant Benefices. Madame de Chiverny, who conducted Mademoiselle de Montpensier to the Frontiers of Spain, is also come back hither, and has brought with her the Prince of Asturias's Picture set with Diamonds, which that Prince had sent her for a Present. The King made some Days ago a Promotion among the Officers of the Marine. It is said his Majesty will make shortly a Promotion of several Marshals of France, and they talk among others of the Duke of Noailles, the Marquess d'Allegre, the Count de Medavi, and the Prince of Tingry. The Duke of Chartres being recovered of his Fever, is now in a Condition to walk about, and his Highness receives the Compliments upon his Recovery from all Persons of Distinction. The following Extract of the Advices relating to the Plague received by the Court to the 28th of January, has been communicated to the foreign Ministers.

M. de Rambion Brigadier in the Vivaretz, in his Letters of the 12th and 13th of January writes, that it had been proved a Man who died suddenly near St. Marcel d'Ardeche, was taken off by an Epileptick Fit: The Brigadier was expecting Orders from M. de Rotie to raise the Blockade of four Houses where that Man had been. 14 Houses without Aubenas which had been put under Quarantain, were in good Health. Laurac in the Country with which Communication is prohibited has had three Houses infested; that Place is blocked up. The rest of the Vivaretz is in good Health. M. d'Iverny Brigadier employed in the Sevennes, in his of the 13th of January confirms in general the Decrease of the Distemper. M. de Rothe Lieutenant-General in his of the 14th and 16th of January advises, that the Sicknes seemed to be ceasing every where. M. de Fleyres who commands at Marvejols, in his of the 30th of December writes, that the Town was then in the 13th Day of its Quarantain, without the least Inconvenience; the Violence of the Distemper was abated. He had caused the dead to be buried deep in the ground, and the Streets to be cleaned; good Order was kept in all other respects by the Care and Vigilance of the Physicians. The Bishop of Alais in his of the 9th and 12th of January writes, that the Distemper seemed to be on the Decline; that in all Events the Town was supplied with Provisions for three Months, and Infirmarys in readiness to receive above 300 sick; the Number of which was then but 23 or 23.

The Chevalier de Rochepierre in his of the 13th of January, assures us the Vivaretz is in good Health, and that it was of an Epilepsy the Inhabitant of the Parish of St. Marcel d'Ardeche died. Chambon had finished its Quarantain. On the 12th St. Genaix had not had one dead or sick since the 24th of December. The Duke de Roquelaure in his of the 13th of January confirms the Accounts above given, as having received them from several Officers. At Marvejols the ordinary Distempers had returned, by which the Physicians judged the Contagion was drawing to an End. Two Inhabitants there who had broken Quarantain, had been set in the Pillory, and then led through the Streets and put into Prison. La Canourgue keeps in good Health. Its Canton, and those of Cause, St. George, and la Chapelle, were disinfecting. M. de Launay the commanding Officer in the County of Sault, in his of the 8th and 16th of January, advises that Dauphiné continues in good Health, and that the Lines are well kept. Avignon still loses 25 or 30 Persons a Day. The Advices from Orange tell us, that none were sick there, and that the infested Places of the Comtat were growing better and better; but the Advices from those Parts are subject to Variation. M. de Vedrille in his of the 13th of January writes, that the Contagion which was thought to be extinct at Orange, had broke out again, two having fallen sick on the 9th. The Marquess de Brancas writes the 9th of January, that there were 12 sick still in the Infirmarys of Alauch, most of them out of Danger. The general Disinfection ended the 8th, and it was hoped no new Accident would happen. Had it not been for the Relapse at Alauch, the Prohibition of Communication with Marseilles would have been taken off. The Marquess had been informed by M. du Pont, that the Sicknes in the two Baskides of Ollioules had gone off without any ill Consequences. Nothing is said in these Letters of Besse and Roquebrussanne, which is a Sign of their being perfectly well.
