THE Princess Ragotski, who came hither about five or six Months ago, died on the 18th Instant at Night of a Quinsy, after two Days Sickness. The Dutchess Dowager of Orleans, to whom that Princess was related, is gone into Mourning for her, as is also the Duke Regent. The Infanta of Spain will arrive this Night at Orleans, where she is to rest some Days, but the Day of her Entry here is not yet fixed; some say it will be the 2d, and others the 4th of next Month. The Night before her Arrival she will lie at Berny, a Country House of the Cardinal de Bissy's, whither the Duke Regent will go to receive her, and conduct her to the Bourg de la Reine, where the King will meet her, and lead her into a House belonging to the Sieur des Marchay, and afterwards his Majesty will come back hither to receive her stepping out of her Coach at the great Stairs of the Tuilleries. The Balls which were designed to be given on that Occasion, will be put off, by reason of the Jubilee, which will begin on Sunday the 1st of next Month, and there will be only Fireworks and Illuminations. The Chancellour and Dukes and Peers, have acquiesced with the Cardinals having the Precedency in the Council of Regency. The following Extract of the Advices relating to the Plague received by the Court to the 18th of February, has been communicated to the foreign Ministers.

M. de Bernage in his Letter of the 3d of February, sends an Extract of Advices from the Gevaudan. The 30th of January Alais had not had in six Days but one Maid-Servant and one Burier of the Dead taken ill. The 21st at St. Genaix one dead and one sick. The 26th at Laurac one dead and three taken ill. Mende has still some sick. The 26th at Fontjulers three dead. At Monrodod two dead and two taken sick since the Quarantain began there. At Chauferans three dead and two sick in eight Days. At Greze fix dead and six sick in nine Days. At Marvejols a Woman died on the 26th. At Bramonas one sick. All the other Places have for a long time been in good Health. The Chevalier Damas, in his of the 2d of February, sends a Letter from M. de Rothe of January 30, importing, that the Cevennes and the Gevaudan continue in a good Way, and that the Country on this Side of the Line is in perfect Health. There is no Want of any thing in those Parts. M. de Rothe in his of the 4th of February confirms, that all goes well every where. The Bishop of Alais writes the 2d of February, that none had been taken sick that Day neither in the Town nor among those performing Quarantain, and that the two preceding Days only one Woman and a Child died in the Infirmaries: M. de Vieuffens a Physician at Alais, in his of the 3d of February, sends the same Account, and that there were 34 sick in the Suburbs in a lair way of Recovery. M. Bernard the commanding Officer at Alais, writes the 30th of January, that the last Person who was taken sick there had Tumours without a Fever, which had not been observed before, his Tongue and his Eyes were not at all changed, and the Physicians concluded the Distemper was on the Decline. 35 remained sick in the Suburbs, and 56 were recovering. M. de Rambion in his of the 2d of February writes, that since the 21st of January no more than one had fallen sick at St Genaix. There was no Suspicion of the Distemper on this side of the Line, from Rouergue to Auvergne. The Duke de Roquelaure in his of the 4th of Febru-

ary, confirms all the forementioned Accounts, as having had them separately from the several commanding Officers. M. le Bret Intendant in Provence writes the 1st of February, that at Alauch none have lately fallen sick. M. de Launoy the commanding Officer at Pierrelatte, writes the 5th and 7th of February, that Dauphiné is still in a good State of Health, and the Line well kept. He had been informed, that the Plague had decreased a little at Avignon, and that the Places which had been infected in the Comtat grew better likewise. It was reckoned that Orange had perfectly recovered.
