Constantinople, February 19.

A Few Days ago one Polycarry a Native of Cephalonia and Physieian to her Czarish Majesty, arrived here with Letters from the Czar to the Grand Signior and Vizier, to notify the Peace with Sweden: He at first demanded to deliver in Person his Letter to the Grand Signior, and to have his Expences defrayed by the Port; but both those Demands being refused, he was contented to accompany the Muscovite Resident when he delivered the Czar's Letters to the Vizier: The said Polycarry is gone back with the Grand Signior's Answer, which was directed in the usual Stile, to the Czar of Muscovy, without the Title of Emperour, which was a Point the Muscovite Resident had pressed very earnestly, but without Success. A Persian Ambassadour is arrived here, and has had his publick Audiences; His Business is, to return the Compliments made by the Turkish Ambassadour sent lately to Persia, on the Circumcision of the Grand Signior's Son, and to cultivate a good Understanding between the two Empires, especially at this Juncture, when there is a Rebellion in Persia. The Persians are the more complaisant to the Turks at this Time, lest the Grand Signior should give Succour to the Chief of the Rebels in Persia, on Account of his being of the Mahometan Sect. The Port has received Advice, that this Rebel has sacked a City called Schamachia situate on the Caspian Sea and belonging to the King of Persia, where was the chief Settlement of the Muscovites who Trade into Persia, and that he has not only plundered the Muscovite Merchants of their Effects, to the Value of 100000 Pound Sterling, but has also put about 200 of them to the Sword. The Muscovite Resident here having complained of this Hostility to the Port, the Vizier has answered that he was no Subject nor Friend of the Grand Signior, and that the Port had nothing to do with him.

Madrid, March 30. The Duke de St. Simon, one of the French Ambassadours, having had his Audience of Leave of the King on the 21st Instant, and been present at the investing the Marquess de Maulevrier his Colleague in the Embassy with the Ensigns of the Order of the Golden Fleece on the 23d, set out the 24th on his Return to Paris. M. de Chavigny having presented his Credential Letters, as Minister of France, it is expected the Marquess de Maulevrier will soon begin his Journey for Paris. On the 28th Orders were sent to Don Patricio Laules at Paris, to take upon him the Character of his Catholick Majesty's Ambassadour there, in the Absence of

the Diked'Offuna. Orders will be sent To-Morrow to Cadiz and the other Ports of Spain, for reducing the Quarantain for Ships coming from Great Britain from 30 to 10 Days.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Treasury having appointed Money for paying of Half Pay to Sea Officers from the 30th of June 1721, to the 31st of December last, according to His Majesty's Establishment on that behalf; These are to give Notice, that the said Payments will begin to be made at the Treasurer of the Navy's Office in Broad-street, on Monday the 16th Instant for the Captains, Tuesday the 17th for the Lieutenants, and Wednesday the 18th for the Masters; that all Persons concerned may then and there attend to receive what may become payable to them, and not only bring with them the Affidavits required, touching their not having enjoyed the Benefit of any Publick Employment whatsoever, either at Sea or on Shore, during the Time they were to be Paid the said Half Pay, but also produce Certificates (if they have not done it already) that they have subscribed the Test and taken the Oaths required by the late Act of Parliament; and in case any of the said Officers shall not be able to attend themselves to receive their Money, but employ Attornies for that
