Cadiz, March 31.

HIS Britannick Majesty's Ships the Winchelsea, Dursley-Galley, and Tryal Sloop, are arrived here from Lisbon.

Paris, April 18. The following Advices received by the Court relating to the Plague, have been communicated to the foreign Ministers.

The Duke de Roquelaure writes the 30th of March, that they continue to flatter themselves the Plague will soon cease. M. de Loure Major at Alais, in his Letter of the 28th of March relates, that the sick who remained in the Infirmarys died the Night between the 24th and 25th: During the Month of March no more than 21 Persons died there. M. de Rambion in his of the 29th of March, says a young Woman belonging to an Inn in the Village of Rabiere, in the Parish of Blachere, had a Plague Tumour on her. Another was dead in the Village of Sebibas, having Tumours and black Spots all over the Body, and having lain sick but twice 24 Hours. Those two Places are within the Blockade of St. Genaix, where the Distemper has not ceased yet, nor at Laurac. M. de Rothe in his of the 30th of March writes, that a young Man who had been ill at Ulez was cured, a Tumour which he had being only an ordinary Swelling. A Woman who had died there had no Marks of the Plague on her. The Disinfection of Goods in the Gevaudan was begun. The Duke of Berwick writes the 5th of April, that the young Woman sick at Rabiere had no Fever, and it was believed her Sickness would not prove contagious. A Man had died suddenly at St. Genaix in Rouergue, but without any Mark of Contagion. M. du Villars writes the 27th of March, that he had prohibited all Communication with the Villages of Rabiere and Sebibas, on Account of the two Accidents above-mentioned. St. Genaix and Laurac were a little worse the last Quarter of the last Moon and the first of this. M. de Rothe in his of the first of April says, that the 30th of March a Man died suddenly at Alais, and two Persons fell ill. The 31st of March three died suddenly, and three fell ill. Eight remained in the Infirmarys. The 26th and 27th two died and three were taken sick at Mende, one remained in the Infirmarys. The 28th one died and one fell sick at Laurac. The 30th two fell sick at Arbouce. Ulez is in a good

State of Health. This Spring and the Summer will decide whether the Distemper will cease. The Chevalier Dumas, in his of the first of April, confirms the good State of Health of the Gevaudan and of the Sevennes. St. Genaix and its Hamlets are the only Places that keep us in Apprehension. M. de Chasse writes the 29th of March, that the Plague continues at Avignon, because no good Order is observed there.
