Paris, April 25.

THE King's Coronation is fixed to be at Rheims the Beginning of September next: At which Solemnity the antient Secular Peers of France are, it is said, to be represented by the following Persons, viz. The Duke of Burgundy by the Duke of Orleans, the Duke of Normandy by the Duke of Chartres, the Duke of Guyenne by the Duke of Bourbon, the Count of Elanders by the Count of Charolois, the Count of Thoulouse by the Count of Clermont, the Count of Champagne by the Prince of Conry. The following Advices received by the Court relating to the Plague, have been communicated to the foreign Ministers.

M. de Rambion in his Letter of the 9th of April relates, that since the 5th of April six Persons had died within the Blockade of St. Genaix, that the Inhabitants were ordered to retire into Barracks; but that there was no Suspicion of the Plague on this Side of the Line from Rouergue to Velay. M. de Rothe writes the 8th and 10th of April, that the new Accidents which had happened in the Vivarais had not produced any ill Consequence. The Gevaudan was in a very good Condition, and in all the other suspected Parts of the Country there remained but five or six sick. M. de la Deveze in his of the 5th of April, says, that of 22 Places which he was newly come from viewing, he found 14 where the Distemper had not been felt for above two Months past and more. He was going to give Directions for disinfecting or perfuming and airing Stuffs manufactured in that Part of the Country. The Duke de Roquejaure in his of the 6th, 7th and 10th of April writes, that Marvejols was in perfect Health, the Disinfection of that Town was finished the 27th of March. Mendes had four Persons taken sick between the 28th of March and the 1st of April, two others had died and two remained sick in the Infirmaries. The Bishop of Alais writes the 7th of April, that since the 2d none had died or fallen ill there of the Contagious Dilemper.

Provence. The Marquess de Brancas in his Letters of the 3d, 6th and 8th of April writes, that the Death of three Children in one Family, and of a Priest, in 15 Days, in an House at Marceilles, had extremely alarmed that City; but that the Bodies having been viewed had no Marks of Contagion; and besides, the Easter-Holidays having since passed with all free Communication, and no Accident happening, every body was satisfied it was a false Alarm. M. le Bret writes the 4th and 8th of April, that the Sheriffs of Marceilles appeared very easy upon the Occurrence abovementioned, though concerned for the Effect it would have on the Commerce of their Town. He was of Opinion the Fright was groundless, the Town continuing since in a good State of Health.

The Comtat. M. de Nogaret writes the 9th of April, that he had an Account from the Consuls of Avignon that the Town began to be better; Preparations were making there for the general Quarantain; and if the People would become more governable, it might be hoped the Distemper would soon cease there: The said Quarantain was to begin the 6th. M. d'Orlay writes the 12th of April, that the Number of Persons dying at Avignon decreased daily.
