St. James's, the 5th Day of May, 1722.

HIS Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to order the Right Honourable the Lord High Chancellour to issue Writs for Proroguing the Parliament which was appointed to meet on the 10th of this Instant, to Tuesday the 5th of June next; and also for Proroguing the Convocations of Canterbury and York which were appointed to meet on the 18th of this Instant, to Friday the 29th of the said Month of June.

Madrid, April 28. By an Express from Cadiz we have the News of the Arrival there of an Advice-Boat which came from Vera-Cruz the 6th of January last. We have an Account by this Vessel, that the Spanish Galleon and the British South-Sea-Company's Ship arrived in December last at Cartagena, where European Goods then bore a very high Price.

Berac, April 22, N.S. Advices from Coire of the 7th Instant, tell us they had an Account there from Vienna and Milan, that his Imperial Majesty had approved and ratified the Treaty called the Capitular, which the Baron de Greuch the Imperial Envoy with the Grisons negotiated and adjusted some time ago with that State, but which had not been ratified till now.

Turin, April 29, N.S. On the 26th Instant Count Belgioioso had a private Audience of his Sardinian Majesty, being conducted to Court in the Marquess del Borgo's Coach. The 27th being the Prince of Piedmont's Birth-Day, his Royal Highness received the Compliments of the Nobility. In the Evening there was a splendid Ball at Court, and last Night an Opera was performed there. His Sardinian Majesty having declared, that in Consideration of the happy Marriage of the Prince of Piedmont, he will give all devout Roman Catholics the Satisfaction of adoring the holy Handkerchief, a famous Relick kept here; it is accordingly to be exposed to publick View on the 4th of May, when a great Concourse of People is expected from the neighbouring Countries, to be present at that religious Solemnity, in which seven Bishops are to officiate.

Turin, May 2, N.S. On the 30th past the Bishops had Audiences in form of their Sardinian Majesties, to congratulate them upon the Marriage of the Prince of Piedmont. Scaffolds are raising round the Court of the Palace, and round the *Place Chateau*, for the Convenience of those who intend to join in the Adoration of the Santo Sudario (or Holy Handkerchief) which is to be exposed with great Solemnity on Monday the 4th Instant. The Counts di Belgioioso and the Count Arconati the Milaneze Deputies, were on the 30th past carried to see the Veneria, where the Marquess de Baranger, by Order from the King, attended and treated them.

Dantzick, April 29. We have Advice from Moscow, that the Czar continues there, but that he has relolved upon an Expedition towards the Caspian Sea, and will go himself to command in Person the chief Body of Forces to be employed in it. The Troops already marching for this Service, are 15000 regular Foot, and 8000 Dragoons, under General Allart: They will be transported by Sea; in order to which a number of Vessels is fitting out at Casan and Astracan with all Diligence, to be commanded by Admiral Apraxin: The Czar will go with them. They are to land in Schirwan, a Province of Persia, and are to make themselves Masters of Derbant, and of Schamachy the Capital; whereby they will secure the Passages

and open an easy Way to Chilan, another Province which by its Situation and Inclosure of Mountains is almost separated from the rest of Persia. At the same Time, another Body of 40000 Men, to consist of 10000 Cossacks from the Don, 10000 from the Ukraine, 10000 Calmucks, and 10000 Baskiers and other Tartars, is to march from Astracan by Land, to attack the Usbecks on the other side; by which the Czar proposes to gain almost all the Borders of the Caspian Sea: He thinks to finish this Campaign in four Months, and then to return to Moscow.

Hague, May 12, N.S. M. Ganfinot, Resident both from the Elector of Bavaria and from the Prince of Bavaria Bishop of Munster, notified Yesterday to the States General the Advice he had received that Morning by an Express, that the said Bishop is chosen Coadjutor to the Archbishop Elector of Cologne his Uncle.

Whitehall, April 16, 1722.

This is to signify in His Majesty's Name, that if any Person or Persons shall hereafter apprehend any one or more Highwaymen, who from and after the Date hereof shall have robbed any of the Mails, or shall have been concerned as Accomplices in the robbing of any of them, such Person or Persons shall have a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds for each Offender, who shall be convicted thereof, to be paid by the Receiver General of the Post-Office, over and above the Reward directed by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person hereafter concerned in robbing any of the Mails shall make a Discovery of the same, so that his Accomplice or Accomplices shall be convicted thereof, such Person shall have His Majesty's most gracious Pardon, and also receive the Reward of Two Hundred Pounds for each Offender so convicted, to be paid as aforesaid.
