**T**HE Marquels de Grimaldo Secretary of State, has by Order and in the Name of his Catholick Majesty assured Mr. Stanhope the British Ambassadour at this Court, that the naval Armament which is now making in some of the Ports of Spain, shall not be employed in any Expedition contrary to the Engagements between this Crown and that of Great Britain.

Paris, May 11, N. S. All the Irish Regiments which were quartered near the Coasts of this Kingdom, are removed up into the Inland Parts of the Country by Order of the Duke Regent: And express Orders have been issued, forbidding any Person to go over from France into Great Britain, without a Passport from the Court.

Paris, May 11, N. S. The following Advices received by the Court relating to the Plague, have been communicated to the foreign Ministers.

The Bishop, the Governour, and the Ayde Major of Alais, in their Letters of the 20th and 21st of April write, that a Child of five Years old falling sick in the City, died four Hours after it was removed to the Infirmary: Upon this it was judged proper to cause the Goods of the House where it sickened to be burnt, and to put under Quarantain without the Town those who lived in that House. Notwithstanding which it was believed the Plague had intirely ceased there, this Accident having not had any Consequence. The Duke de Roquelaure in his of the 22d writes the same things, and adds that the Persons put under Quarantain, who were eight in Number, were yet in perfect Health, that there was no Proof of their having had any Communication with the Child, and that in all likelihood the Poverty and Uncleanliness of the Parents occasioned the Accident. M. de Bernage in his of the 22d, gives the same Account from Alais. There had not been any sick at Mende since Palm-Sunday. Nor any at St. Leger for above a Month. Nor at Greze and Montodat for 12 or 15 Days. Nor at Molines in 50. Nor at Chambonet and le Buirson for near a Month. La Canorgue has one or more taken sick from Time to Time. In all the other Places there are none sick. M. de Rambion writes the 21st of April, that three Children had died at Laurac, that their Mother was fallen sick, but that it was hoped the Precautions taken would prevent any Consequences. A young Woman who died some Days before at Frassinat was thought to have had the Plague; but nothing ill from it had happened there since. St. Genaix and its Blockade were in a good State of Health; there remained but one sick, who was recovering. The Chevalier Damas in his of the 21st and 24th gives an Account that he had made a Tour with the Duke de Roquelaure, by the Way of St. Esprit, Beaucaire, and other Places to Nismes; and affirms the Distemper is ceasing in the Sevennes, the Gevaudan, and the Vivarais. No more than two sick remained in all the infected

Country, one at Laurac and the other at Mende. The Chevalier d'Aiguille, in his of the 22d and 23d, sends the Copy of a Letter from the Syndick of the Gevaudan, who confirms the good State of Health of that Country.

Provence. M. de Belricu in his of the 26th of April writes, that the Accident at Marseilles had not had any ill Consequences. M. de Pilles Commandant at Marseilles, in his of the 21st of April, assures us that Town is in perfect Health, and that the Blockade of Alauch was intirely raised, and the Troops all withdrawn. M. le Bret in his of the 20th says, he had received the same Day a Letter from the Sheriffs of Marseilles, importing that the Town and its Infirmaries were in perfect Health. The Marquels de Braocas in his of the 22d of April, gives the same Account from Marseilles, and says he was persuaded they had taken a false Alarm there.

The Comtat. M. de Saffelange writes the 24th, that since the 15th there was an open Communication at Avignon, that no more than one or two a Day fell sick there, and that it was believed the Distemper was ceasing. The rest of the Comtat was very well. The Commiffary Ruelle writes the 25th, that the Report which had been spread some Days, that Persons were newly seized with the Contagion at Orange, was without Foundation.
