N the 19th Inftant the following humble Address was presented to His Majefty by the Deputy-Lieutenants of the Tower Hamlets, being introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Carteret one of His Majefty's Principal Secretaries of State.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Deputy-Lieutegants of the Tower-Hamlets.

Molt Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majefty's moß faithful and loyal Subjects, being whus permitted to apptoach your Royal Throne, beg Leave to declare our just Abhorence of that wicked Confpiracy which feveral of your Majefty's Subjects, contrary to their Allegiance, have entred into, in Concert with Traitors Abroad, for raifing a Rechellion in favour of a Popifh Pretender, and to overthrow our excellent Confitution in Church and State.

This traiterous Defign being fo early difcovered, is a fresh Instance of your great Wildom to prevent the dismal Calamities which would neceffarily attend such howid Rebellion; and we cannot express the Happiness of your faithful Subjects under the Administration of so gracious a Prince, always watchful for the good and lasting Welfare of his People. Your Majesty's frequent Clemency, even to your worst Enemies, might demand a suitable Return of grateful Submission; but these restless Spirits cannot be fatisfied with the Peace and Plenty they might enjoy, while the benign Influence of your mild Government extends to the utmost Limits of your Kingdoms, and to every Subject therein.

As we are armed by the Laws of the Land, and the Authority of your Majefty's Commiffion, we are firmly refolved to exert our felves in your Majefty's Service, and to be vigilant in lupprefing all tomultuous Affemblies and siofous Perfons, who shall dare to disturb your Majesty's Peace, violate the Honour, and hazard the Safety of your facred Perfon and Royal Family, the great Defence and Bulwark, under divine Providence, of our seligious and civil Liberties, with all that is valuable and dear to us.

And we beg Leave to affure your Majefty, that we shall always effect our felves obliged to maintain and defend your rightful and lawful Title to the Crown of these Realms, to the utmost of our Power, against all the fearet and open Attempts of a Popish or Rebellious Faction, which would turn our happy Constitution, Ecclefiastical and Civil, into Tyranny and Superstition.

That your Majefty, the beft of Kings, may be long preferved, by divine Protection, for the Safety and Profperity of your faithful People; and that the like Bleffings may be conveyed down to the Jateft Pofterity, by Princes descending from you, and inheriting your Majefty's Royal Virtues, is the hearty Prayer,

May it pleafe your Majefty, of your Majefty's most dutiful and most obedient Subjects.

To which His Majefty was pleafed to return the following most gracious Answer.

I Thank you for this dutiful and loyal Address, and am fully perswaded of your Zeal and Affettion for my Person and Government.

After which they had all the Honour to kife His Majefty's Hand: And His Majefty was pleafed to confee the Honour of Knighthood on Daniel Dolios and Ifaac Tillard, Efges two of the faid Deputy-Lieutenants.
