The Marquês de Brancas writes the 13th of May, that since the 11th at Night four had died or fallen sick in the same Street where the first were taken ill, and that Street was barricaded the 13th. A Surgeon was fallen sick. All proper Dispositions were made, in Case of a further Relapse, for Hospitals, Places for Quarantain, in Firmaries, Buriers of the Dead, Physicians, and Surgeons: Barriers were settled, and generally wherever is necessary for preventing the being surprized.

The Comtat. The Marquês de Nogaret writes the 4th of May, that he had spoke that Day to the Marquês de Galean at the Barrier of Avignon, who told him that during the four preceding Days the Distemper had much decreased there, and that but few died or fell sick. Two Persons out of several who had concealed infected Goods had been severely whipped. A Quarantain was beginning there. Those who shall come out of their Houses are to pay a large Fine, and if they are not able to pay it, the Men are to be made Buriers of the dead, and the Women to be made Nurset to infected Persons. It was feared this would not be regularly observed, because the People still continue ungovernable.
