PROCLAMATION, Λ

For the Electing a Peer of Scotland to fit in Parliament in the Room of John Earl of Rothes deceased.

GEORGE R.

WHereas by the Advice of our Privy-Council we did fummon a Parliament of Great Bri tain to meet and be held at Westminster the Tenth Day of May last past; and whereas we prorogued the faid Parliament to the Third Day of July next; And whereas by the Advice of our Privy-Council we have thought fit to order that the faid Parliament be fur-ther prorogued to the Second Day of August next enfuing ; And whereas John Earl of Rothes was duly elected, and returned to be one of the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, to fit in the Houfe of Peers in the faid Parliament, and is fince his Election and Resurn deceafed: In order to the Electing another Peer of Scotland to fit in his Room, we do, by the Advice of our Prrvy Council, issue forsh this our Royal Proclamation, striftly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holy Rood House in Edinburgh, on Wednesday the Fifteenth Day of August next ensuing, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Asternoon, to Nominate and Chuse another Peer of Scotland, to Sit and Vote in the House of Peers of the said Parliament of Great Britain, in the Room of the faid John Earl of Rothes deceased, by open Életti on and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that fball be then prefent, and the Proxies for fuch as fball be absent, Juch Proxies being Peers, and producing a Mandate in Writing, duly figned before Witneffes, and both the Conftituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law. And the Lord Clerk Regijter, or fuch two of the Principal Clerks of the Seffion, as hall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the faid Peers, and to take their Votes, and immediately after such Election made, and duly examined, to certifie the Name of the Peer fo Elected, and Sign and Attelt the fame in the Prefence of the faid Peers, and return fuch Certifi-cate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And sue strictly Charge and Command, That this Our Royal Proclamation may be Publifbed at Our Market Crofs at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns of Scotland, Twenty five Days at least before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the faid Peers, to proceed to fuch Elettion.
