

Whitehall, April 16, 1722.

This is to signify in His Majesty's Name, that if any Person or Persons shall hereafter apprehend any one or more Highwaymen, who from and after the Date hereof shall have robbed any of the Mails, or shall have been concerned as Accomplices in the robbing of any of them, such Person or Persons shall have a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds for each Offender, who shall be convicted thereof, to be paid by the Receiver General of the Post-Office, over and above the Reward directed by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person hereafter concerned in robbing any of the Mails shall make a Discovery of the same, so that his Accomplice or Accomplices shall be convicted thereof, such Person shall have His Majesty's most gracious Pardon, and also receive the Reward of Two Hundred Pounds for each Offender so convicted, to be paid as aforesaid.

The Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury being enabled to discharge and cancel the Exchequer Bills, amounting to One Million, which were, on the 7th Day of June 1720, issued by way of Loan, to the South-Sea Company; Their Lordships, according to the Directions of Acts of Parliament in that behalf, do hereby give Notice, That all Persons possessed of the said Loan Bills, shall have time, till Tuesday the Seventh Day of August 1722, to bring in and deliver the said Bills to any the Takers of the Receipts of the Exchequer, at their Offices there; who are thereupon to pay to the Bearer of such Bills, the Principal and Interest to the Day on which they shall be so brought, such Day being on or before the Seventh Day of August 1722, as aforesaid: And, if in case the said Bills be not brought in on or before the Day affixed as aforesaid, their Lordships do further signify, that, according to the Directions of the Act 8<sup>o</sup> George II, all such of the said Bills as shall not be brought in upon this Notice to be discharged, lose their Currency, and no Interest is to grow due thereupon after Lady-Day 1722. And whereas not only the Exchequer Bills, called Loan Bills, now meant to be cancelled, but also all other the Exchequer Bills subsisting at the time the said Loan Bills were issued, carried Interest of One Penny per Cent. per Diem only, in the Body of the said Bills, but it was afterwards thought fit and agreed, for supporting the Credit and Currency of the said Bills, that One Penny per Cent. per Diem, additional Interest, should attend, and be paid in the said Bills, from the eighth Day of October 1720, and publick Notification thereof was given by the then Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the said Interest and Additional Interest, making together Two Pence per Cent. per Diem, has attended and been paid, or is payable on the said Bills accordingly; Now, the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury having contracted and agreed with the Bank of England, for the Circulating and Exchanging of all Exchequer Bills, at Demand, during the Space of one Year, beginning from the 24th Day of July 1722, their Lordships give Notice that the said additional Interest of One Penny per Cent. per Diem, not only on the said Loan Bills, but other the old Exchequer Bills, that had then a joint Currency with them, is to cease and be no longer paid, than to the said 24th Day of July 1722: So that from and after that Day, the Interest on the said Bills will be One Penny per Cent. per Diem only, as the same stand expressed and declared in the Body of the same Bills.

Admiralty-Office, July 25, 1722.

It having been agreed by the 4th Article of the Treaty of Peace lately made between His Majesty and the King of Fez and Morocco, That the Ships of War, or Ships of Corso, belonging to the said King of Fez and Morocco, or any of His Subjects, meeting with any Ships or Vessels whatsoever belonging to the Subjects of His Majesty, not being in any of the Seas appertaining to His Majesty's Dominions, may send on board one single Boat, with two Sitters, and no more, which Sitters only shall have Liberty to enter into such Ships or Vessels aforesaid, and that upon producing a Pass signed by His Majesty, or by the Lord High Admiral, or Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, the said Boat shall immediately depart, and such Ship or Vessel shall freely proceed on her Voyage; and there being the like Provision made in the said 4th Article of the Treaty, that when any of the Ships of His Majesty, or of His Subjects, shall meet with any Ship or Vessel of the King of Fez and Morocco, or of His Subjects, if the Commander of such Ships or Vessels shall produce a Pass signed by the Governour of the Place whereto they belong, with a Certificate from the English Consul, or in case of his decease, or absence, from the Major Part of the English Merchants residing upon the said Place, in such case the said Ships or Vessels shall proceed freely on their Voyage, without Impediment or Molestation; The Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have thought fit to publish what hath been thus stipulated by the aforesaid Treaty, for the Information of all Persons who are or may be concerned therein.
