Paris, Aug. 8. We have Advices from Rome or the 18th of July, importing, that the Beginning of that Month the Turkish Fleet consisting of 17 Sultanas, 16 Aug. 8. We have Advices from Rome of the Gallies, and other Vessels with Oars, and 60 Transports, approached the Coasts of Sicily near Syracusa and Cape Passaro: The commanding Officers at Syracusa and Noto thought proper to let the Turks surnish them-selves with Water and what other Respessments they required, and the Turks paying punctually for the Provisions they took on Board, no Disorder happened. The Turks reported, that in their Passage they met Captain Golfo, a Venetian Admiral, with six Men of War and some Gallies; and that they saluted each other and then pursued their several Voyages. Letters from Sicily of the 7th of July relate, that the Ottoman Fleet fill continued at Cape Passage. Passaro, expecting a Reinforcement of more Ships of War and Transports. We have Advice, that the War and Iraniports. We have having that the Great Master of the Order of Masta is making all the necessary Preparations for a vigorous Defence in Case of an Attempt by the Turks; and has put 3000 Men into the Fortress of Gozzo. The 15th of July the Pope held a Congregation of War, in which it was resolved that Orders should be fent to Civita Vecchia for getting together a sufficient Number of Seamen and Soldiers for arming the Pope's fix Gallies which are defigned to join the Maltele Gallies, and to conveigh into the Port of Malta the Italian Knights of that Order; which is however thought a very difficult Enterprize, because of the fuperior Strength of the Turkith Fleet. The Alarm was so great at Rome and in the adjacent Country up-on this Expedition of the Turks, that Orders were sent for all the Militia to be ready to draw out on the first Notice, for as to the regular Troops of the Eccle-fiastical State they do not exceed at this Time 600 ef-fective Men. According to our Advices from Flo-rence the Great Duke who was lately in a bad State of Health, is in a good way of Recovery. Very rich Liveries were making at Rome for Cardinal Ottoboni, who is to affift on the Part of the Pope at the most Christian King's Coronation, in the Quality of Legate à Latere. P. S. We have just received an Account by Letters from Sicily of the 9th past, that the Turkish Fleet increased daily, and was then cruising in the Channel of Malta; but it was judged, that either their Measures had been disconcerted by the Dis-covery of a Conspiracy in their favour on the Island of Malta, or that they were waiting still for a further Reinforcement.
