**L**ETTERS from Medway say the King's Journey to Schonen is fixed to the 21st Instant, and that the Queen will accompany him thither.

*Turin, Aug. 5, N. S.* On the 2d Instant in the Evening the King and Court returned from the Venecia to Rivoli, from whence they are expected in Town towards the Beginning of next Month, when his Majesty designs to form a Camp on a Plain within three Miles of this Place for reviewing and exercising his Troops. Mr. Moleworth the British Envoy at this Court, has for some Days past been very much indisposed, but is now judged to be on the mending Hand.

*Cambray, Aug. 10, N. S.* The Commandeur M. Delaval, who is charged with the Affairs of the Order of Malta at the Congress here, has received a Letter from Malta giving an Account, that on the 3d of July five Turkish Sultanas, or Ships of War, appeared before that Place, and the Commanding Officer sent in a Letter to the Great Master, requiring him to deliver up all the Mahometan Slaves, and to send an Answer to Tunis. Those Ships cruized in Sight of the Town two Days, and then went away. The Letter adds, that if they returned they would find the Island in a good Posture of Defence.

*Paris, Aug 12, N S.* His Excellency the Lord Whitworth, Ambassadour Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from the King of Great Britain to the Congress of Cambray, arrived here last Night. On the 10th Instant in the Morning, an Order was sent to the Marshal de Villeroy to retire to his Seat of Villeroy: This Order was delivered to him by M. de la Fare Captain of the Guards of his Royal Highness the Duke Regent, and by the Count d'Artagnan Captain-Lieutenant of the Mousquetaires, which last Officer was ordered to accompany the Marshal to Villeroy. On the 11th M. du Liboy, one of the King's Grooms of the Bed-Chamber in Ordinary, went to the Marshal de Villeroy with another Order, to repair to his Government of Lyons, whither the said M. du Liboy is to accompany him, and to re-

main there with him till further Orders. Letters from Madrid of the 27th of last Month say a Courier arrived the 24th from Carthage-na, with Advice that the Spanish and Dutch Squadrons having joined, were lying off Algiers.

This Day M. Hallungius, Envoy from the Duke of Saxe-Gotha, had a private Audience of Leave of His Majesty.

*August 4.* This Day Count Staremberg, Ambassadour and Plenipotentiary Minister from the Emperour, had his first private Audience of His Majesty.

M. Van Borffele, Envoy Extraordinary from the States General, had also a private Audience of Leave of His Majesty.

They were severally introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell, Kt. Master of the Ceremonies.
