Edinburgh, Aug. 19. The Peers of Scotland having assembled to chuse a Peer for the Parliament of Great-Britain, in the Room of the Earl of Rothes deceased, have unanimously elected the Earl of Findlater.

Richmond, Aug. 21. This Day M. Hallungius, Envoy from the Duke of Saxe Gotha, had private Audiences of Leave of both their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales in their respective Apartments, to which he was conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell, Kt. Master of the Ceremonies.

Kensington, Aug. 22. He this Day at a private Audience took his Leave of the young Princesses, being introduced as above.

Whitehall, Aug. 24. This Day the Lord Bishop of Rochester, after having been examined by a Committee of Lords of the Privy-Council, was committed Prisoner to the Tower for High Treason.

At the Court at Kensington, August 25.

This Day the Right Honourable Simon Lord Viscount Harcourt was, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

This Day His Majesty was pleased to order a Proclamation to be Published, declaring that the Parliament shall meet and sit to do Business on the 9th Day of October next.

Whitehall, April 16, 1722.

This is to signify in His Majesty's Name, that if any Person or Persons shall hereafter apprehend any one or more Highwaymen, who from and after the Date hereof shall have robbed any of the Mails, or shall have been concerned as Accomplices in the robbing of any of them, such Person or Persons shall have a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds for each Offender, who shall be convicted thereof, to be paid by the Receiver General of the Post-Office, over and above the Reward directed by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person hereafter concerned in robbing any of the Mails shall make a Discovery of the same, so that his Accomplice or Accomplices should be convicted thereof, such Person shall have His Majesty's most gracious Pardon, and also

also receive the Reward of Two Hundred Pounds for each Offender so convicted, to be paid as aforesaid.
