## Admiralty Office, September 3.

Letter from Captain Ogle Commander of His Ma-jefty's Ship Swallow, dated from Cape Coaft

Road, in Africa, April 5, 1722. IN mine bearing Date the 6th of November laft. I nave an Arriver of November laft, I gave an Account that His Majefty's Ship's Company under my Command were on Recovery, and that I intended in a few Days to ply to Windward and Cruize between Cape Palmas and Cape Three Points; I failed accordingly the 10th Ditto: The Weymouth I left here, (most of the Men being fick) with Orders, when she was in all Respects fit for the Sea, to proceed and Cruize between Cape Mount and Cape Three-Points till the 30th of December.

On the 30th of November I spoke with a Ship belonging to the African Company, come from London, by which I received Mr. Se-cretary Burchett's Letter dated the 3d of Au-gust, acquainting me that the Lords Commissi oners of the Admiralty had ordered me three Months Provisions and Wine in Proportion to be fent for the Use of His Majesty's Ships here ; the Master of the faid Company's Ship informed me he had the Proportion of Beef, Pork, and fome of the Bread aboard, and that the other Provisions with the Wine I might expect very foon by a Ship that was to leave England foon after he failed. The 7th of January I returned hither in Hopes to find the faid Provisions and Wine all arrived, but was difappointed, for neither the Wine nor dry Pro visions were come. The Sickness aboard the Weymouth was not at all abated, but the dry Seafon being come hindred her being further fupplied with Water at this Place, fo that Capt. Heardman, with his small Number of Men that were in Health, and fome Soldiers bor-rowed from this Castle, plyed up to Wind-ward to water at Cape Three-Points. I took in a Month's Beef, Pork, and Bread, which with the Provisions I had on Board, compleated me to three Months of all Species; Peale, and Oatmeal excepted. On the 10th Ditto the Governour here received Advice from the Dutch, that on the 6th two Pyrate Ships had taken a French Ship off of Axim, I left Orders here for Captain Heardman at his Return with His Majefty's Ship the Weymouth to cruize (as foon as fhe was in a Condition for the Sea) between Cape Three Points and Cape Palmas till the 25th of March, and I forthwith got under fail, and ranged down the Coaft for Whydab, but

could gain no Intelligence of the Pyrats till I arrived there, though I met with feveral Ships trading on the Coast in my Passage down. On my Arrival at Whydah I was informed. that two Pyrate Ships, one of 40 and another of 24 Guns commanded by one Roberra had been there, and had failed about 26 Hours before : I found to Sail of Ships in the Road, two of which were English, three French, and five Portugueze, they had all ranfomed at the Rate of eight Pounds Weight of Gold each ; an English Ship, for refusing to ranfom the Pyrates had been burnt with a confiderable Number of Negroes a board. The Pyrates being informed that a French Ship they had taken failed well and had formerly been a Privateer of St Malo, did, notwith fanding a Ranform paid for her, carry her away with a Defign to fit her for their Service and quit their 24 Gun Ship: Therefore I judged they must go to some Place in the Bite to clean and fit the French Ship, before they would think of crui-zing again; which occasioned me to ftretch away into the Bite, and look into those Places which I knew had Depth of Water fufficient for His Majefty's Ship.

On the 5th of February at Daylight, I faw Cape Lopez bearing W. S. W. about three Leagues, and at the fame Time difcovered three Ships at Anchor under the Cape, which I believed to be the Pyrates, two of them having Pendants flying. I was obliged to hawl off N. W. and W. N. W. to clear the Frenchman's Bank, the Wind at S. S. E. and in lefs than an Hour one of the three got under Sail and gave me Chace; and I, to give her a fairer Opportunity of coming up with me without being discovered, kept on the fame Courfe, with the fame Sail abroad I had when I fir (? faw her : About Eleven that Morning fhe got within Gun-fhot of me and fired feveral Chace Guns, under English Colours and a black Flag at her Mizzen-Peek; foon afterwards being come within Musket fhor, I Starboarded my Helm and gave her a Broad-fide, and in an Hour and so half's Time fhe fruck and called for Quarter, we having difabled her very much, and thot down her Main-Top-Maft; the proved to be the French Ship they had taken out of Whydah Road, and had put into hee 32 Guns and 123 Men, 23 of whom were Blacks, fhe had 26 Men killed and wounded, the Captain's Name was Skyrm, who had a Leg fhot off ; the Prifoners informed me, that the two Ships they left at Anchor under the Cape, were Roberts in the 40 Gun Ship, and the other 24 Gun Ship they had that Morning quitted for the Prize. The 6th ditto in the Night, I left the Prize, having put her into the best Condition for failing fo short a Time would allow of, and ordered her away to the Island Princes. I made the best of my Way to Windward again, in order to defery the two Ships that remained at Anchor under Cape Lopez. On the 9th ditto in the Evening, I made the Cape, and faw two Ships Aretchingin under the Land about five Leagues Distance, but not having Day-light enough, I was obliged to stand off and on all Night, and in
